## P R E F A C E.

---

I HAVE taken the liberty of offering this little work to the public, trusting that those imperfections which candour may rebuke generosity will overlook, and that its utility may excuse any apparent presumption of its Author.

A long residence abroad, has made me familiar with the difficulties that foreigners in a strange country experience in obtaining correct information on postage regulations, and under this reminiscence, I have been induced to believe, from the thousands of visitors we are daily receiving in England, the present moment the most opportune for publishing a Post Office Guide.

All public servants, from the highest to the lowest, are so constantly exposed to censure, without any hope of praise, — are so frequently punished for oversight or



neglect, without a chance of applause, — and so open to the tyranny of critics, that I must request the utmost lenity from my readers in forming a judgment, on a subject so difficult to compress into a brief and concise form as *Universal Postage*.

The deep interest I have always taken, however, in the success of the Post Office, during a service of upwards of ten years, has enabled me to afford such information of its general working, as will, I trust, be found both interesting and correct.

**OF all establishments in the world, none has made such progress as the Post Office of Great Britain.**

**No other offers such advantages, whether in a social or political point of view.**

**The prodigious strides that England has made in the application of native industry, in the knowledge of the character, habits, and wants of other climes, in the progress of education by the introduction of other authors than our own, and in the consequent removal of those national prejudices, — the increasing absence of which, is rendering us daily denizens of the world rather than citizens of a particular state or country, — is mainly owing to the rapid and constant interchange of thought between ourselves and our neighbours, by means of the increased facilities of correspondence held out in the present system of postal regulations.**

To cheap and unlimited correspondence we owe the success and extension of our increasing commercial relations all over the world.

It has formed a mighty step towards setting industry free, by enlarging the field of employment, and, as a consequence, augmenting the comforts of the people.

The large mercantile, manufacturing, agricultural, professional, trading, and indeed all other interests, are chiefly indebted to the arrangements of the Post Office, for the extent, punctuality, certainty, and dispatch of their daily transactions, and yet all these benefits are derived by the least onerous and most equitable of all taxes.

For one penny a letter may be sent throughout the kingdom from any remote village to another, no matter how distant.

How far the advantages offered by the Penny Postage Act have been availed of by the public, will be best seen by the Parliamentary Return made to the Honourable the House of Commons in 1850.

The following is a return, as nearly as can be estimated, of the total number of chargeable letters passing through the Post Office from 1839 (the year previous to the adoption of the Penny Postage system) to 1849, inclusive, with also a return of the net revenue during those years.

In the Year ending 1850, the net revenue again rose to 733,863*l.* 2*s.* 11*d.*

Nor is the cheap transmission of letters alone, the only advantage gained by the public under the new Postage Act, for that of newspapers, books, periodicals, prices current, parliamentary processes, &c. &c., is equally facilitated by means of the same reduction in postage.

The extraordinary number of newspapers now published in the several cities and towns all over the kingdom, shows the great eagerness of the people generally to acquire political, social, foreign, and domestic intelligence on all the passing topics of the day.

Seventy millions and upwards of newspapers are posted annually.

How perfect then must be that system of machinery which impels so monstrous a wheel of industry and toil, that is daily receiving and pouring forth such a mass of correspondence and information ; and how much is entrusted by the public to the numerous officials through whose hands this number of epistles and papers, and amount of property, is daily passing.

Not content with sending letters only, correspondents are continually loading them with pins, bracelets, brooches, watches, chains, rings, lace, muslin, cuffs, collars, veils, shoes, boots, gloves, handkerchiefs, and hundreds of other articles of the toilet and the wardrobe : while samples also of the more staple articles of trade and commerce, as corn, flour, seeds, minerals, medicines, patterns of carpets, curtains, cloth, stuffs, and every other kind and description of the produce of art and manufacture, find their way from sender to consumer.

With such an influx of business to the several departments of the office, it would seem almost impossible to calculate upon a punctual dispatch and safe delivery of the almost numberless epistles, and property hourly committed to its care ; yet with such admirable order are all the duties of the *employées* arranged, that but few complaints are heard ; and that in nine cases out of ten, when any irregularity does occur, the fault lies with the public.

Amongst other causes of error is to be assigned the general one of sending letters with money, instead of using stamps; for in some instances it is doubtful if either the letter or the money ever reaches the Post Office.

In many cases it is to be feared that the letter is dispatched without the payment; while by the more ignorant class and the numerous juveniles to whom letters are frequently entrusted for post (and more especially in the small towns and villages), both letter and penny are put into the box together, in which case it is impossible for the postmaster to ascertain, from the number of letters that are found in the box at each successive dispatch, which letters are intended to be paid, and which to be sent unpaid.

Could the use of stamps be universally adopted, it would be a saving of some thousands a year to the revenue for labour alone in the chief cities and towns, and would materially relieve the already over-taxed time of postmasters, receivers, and their subordinates.

If the public would only take one half the care that the Post Office officials practise, if they would *plainly* direct their letters, and with the *post town* especially in a *clear and legible hand*, much loss of time and disappointment might be saved, as well as the tedious inquiries and official correspondence consequent upon irregularity.



In connection with the trust reposed by the public on the officials of the Post Office, numerous instances of singular honesty have come to light, in which large sums of money have been discovered in letters which the vagueness of the address, or the total absence of any whatever, has rendered it impossible to decipher the destination of, and which sums have been restored to the owner.

As an instance, some years ago, 5000*l.* in bank notes was found in a blank cover, and restored to the careless sender.

A further and more extraordinary evidence still, is given by the following return :

To have taken advantage thus of the Post Office, and particularly of late years under the cheap postage act, to have enclosed and forwarded such sums of money through so many channels as they must have traversed, is to say the least, both ungenerous and unwise, and the more so that, since 1840, there have been provided the most secure means of transmitting them direct to the hands of any party for whom they may be destined.

For the small fee of *6d.* over and above the ordinary charge for postage, any sum of money, papers, deeds, or other documents may be sent by the Registration Letter Office (within the size allowed by the Act, 24 inches each way), and delivered from the sender to the person to whom it is addressed, for which a proper receipt is taken from each succeeding official into whose hands it may fall, to prove its delivery.

By that vast boon given to the public in August, 1838, for the transmission of money through the Money Order Office, but which may more properly be called a Public Banking Establishment, any sum may now be remitted in a money order from *1d.* to *5l.*, and so on in orders of *5l.* each to *50l.* and upwards, at the low charge of *3d.* up to *2l.*, and *6d.* for sums above *2l.* and not exceeding *5l.*

Not only may such sums be sent from one party to another, but the orders are transferable, and may be paid to any one in the ordinary course of business, or through a bank, subject of course to an observance of

the regulations made for ensuring correctness in the payment.

A better proof of the high estimation in which this establishment is held cannot be given than by the following return, in which may be seen its unparalleled success above any other system of the kind ever yet introduced.

A Return of the Number and Amount of Money Orders issued and paid in the United Kingdom, during the Year ending 5th January, 1840, the Returns being, to a certain extent, estimated, as respects England, up to the 5th April, 1847.

The difference, 5712*l.* 16*s.* 6*d.*, between the orders issued and paid, may be accounted for from the number of orders unpaid; the orders issued on the 31st of December not being paid until the next and following days, while some remained outstanding and unclaimed for various lengthened periods.

Recurring again to the extensive arrangements for postal communication, the reader cannot fail to look with wonder and admiration, upon the resources afforded for correspondence, not only with this Kingdom, *but with the whole World.*

By that powerful adjunct, Steam, for the transit of mails, to all parts of the Continent, to North and South America, China, the Indies, Australia, Van Dieman's Land, to the numerous small and large Islands of the Atlantic and Pacific, fresh channels for trade and commerce have sprung into existence, before unknown to us; and their petty states and dependencies, with their produce, habits, manners, and languages, seem, comparatively speaking, nearer to our shores.

With reference to the rapidity of the communication kept up by the agency of the Post Office, and which is incomparably one of its greatest advantages, we may observe that, in the year 1783, a letter posted at Bath on the Monday afternoon reached London on the Wednesday following, being two nights and one day on the road. A letter now posted at that place would be in the London Post Office in less than four hours.

We have moreover a delivery daily to all Post Towns in the Kingdom; and to most of the chief Cities and Towns two daily deliveries are made.

We have two Mails across the Channel to Dublin; two to Paris, morning and evening; to Bavaria, Frankfort, Greece, Hanover, Hesse, Lucca, Mecklenburgh, Modena, Oldenburg, Poland, Portugal, Prussia, Switzerland, Tuscany, Wirtemberg, &c. &c. viâ France.

A Mail to the United States of America not long since occupied a voyage of a month, and that with uncertainty; now it reaches in twelve and thirteen days.

A Mail leaves for Australia on the 24th of each month, and on the 20th viâ Southampton.

Mails are also made up twice and thrice a week, weekly, monthly, or bi-monthly, to every place of importance all over the Globe.

**REGULATIONS**

OF THE

RESPECTING LETTERS ADDRESSED

"Post Office, London,"

"Poste Restante, London,"

OR LETTERS SIMPLY ADDRESSED "LONDON."



LETTERS addressed "Post Office, London," or "Poste Restante, London," are delivered only at the Window of the General Post Office, St. Martin's-le-Grand.

The Hours of Delivery from the Post Office Window are from 10 A.M. to 4 P.M.

When the Person applying for Letters is a Foreigner, he must produce his Passport.

When a Foreigner does not apply in Person, but by a Messenger dispatched for that purpose, the Messenger must produce the Passport of the Person

to whom the Letters are addressed, as well as a written Order, signed and dated by such Person.

In the case of a Messenger being sent for the Letters of more Persons than One, he must produce Passports and Orders from each Person.

If the Applicant for the Letters is a subject of the United Kingdom, he must be able to state from what place or district he expects Letters before he can receive them. Subjects of States not issuing Passports are treated as Subjects of the United Kingdom.

If letters are directed to Individuals simply addressed, "London," (and not "Post Office," or "Poste Restante, London,") they will not be delivered from the Window *at all*, but will be sent out by Letter Carrier for delivery at the address furnished by the Applicant.

Foreign Letters addressed "Post Office," or "Poste Restante, London," are retained for Two Months at the Post Office Window. Inland Letters similarly addressed are retained One Month at the Window; after the expiration of these periods both classes of letters are respectively sent to the Dead Letter Office, to be disposed of in the usual manner.

All persons applying for Letters at the Post Office Window must be prepared to give the necessary explanations to the Clerk at the Window, in order to



prevent mistakes, and to insure the delivery of the Letters to the Persons to whom they properly belong.

It will much facilitate the business of the Post Office, if the words "*to be called for,*" are added to the address of Letters which are directed "Post Office, London."

LES lettres adressées “ Post Office, Londres,” ou “ Poste Restante à Londres,” ne peuvent être distribuées qu'au guichet du bureau général de St. Martin's-le-Grand.

La distribution des lettres a lieu au guichet de la poste restante de 10 heures du matin à 4 heures du soir.

Lorsqu'un étranger vient réclamer des lettres il doit exhiber son passe-port.

Quand un étranger ne pouvant se présenter lui même, fait réclamer ses lettres par une autre personne,

cette personne doit être munie du passe-port du destinataire, ainsi que d'une procuration écrite, signée et datée par le destinataire lui même.

Lorsqu'une seule et même personne a mission de réclamer les lettres de différents destinataires elle doit produire le passe-port et la procuration de chacun d'eux.

Lorsque le destinataire d'une lettre est un sujet du Royaume Uni, il doit, avant de la recevoir, en faire connaître l'origine. La même obligation est imposée aux sujets des Pays qui ne délivrent pas de passe-ports.

Lorsqu'une lettre adressée à un particulier porte simplement sur la suscription le mot : "Londres" (et non les mots : "Post Office," ou "Poste Restante, Londres"), elle n'est pas délivrée au guichet mais distribuée par un facteur à l'adresse du réclamant.

Les lettres venant de l'Etranger adressées : "Post Office," ou "Poste Restante, à Londres," sont conservées pendant deux mois à la disposition des destinataires. Les Lettres de l'Intérieur ne sont conservées qu'un mois seulement. A l'expiration de ces délais, ces deux catégories de lettres sont transmises au bureau des rebuts, qui en dispose selon les règlements.

Les personnes qui réclament des lettres au bureau de la Poste Restante doivent être à même de fournir à l'employé du guichet les indications nécessaires pour

prévenir toute méprise et assurer ainsi la remise des lettres à leurs véritables destinataires.

Pour faciliter le travail du Post Office il est bon d'ajouter sur l'adresse des lettres qui doivent être distribuées au guichet du Bureau Central à Londres les mots : "*To be called for.*"

BRIEFE mit der Adresse "Post Office, London," oder "Poste Restante, London," werden nur am Schalter des General Post-Amtes, St. Martin's-le-Grand, verabfolgt.

Die Zeit für die Briefabgabe an diesem Schalter ist von 10 uhr, vormittags, bis 4 uhr, nachmittags.

Wenn der Briefapplicant ein Ausländer ist, so bedarf es der Vorzeigung seines Reisepasses.

Wenn solcher Ausländer jedoch nicht persönlich erscheint, sondern einen Boten zu diesem Zwecke

sendet, so hat solcher Bote den Reisepass des Brief-Adressaten vorzuzeigen; imgleichen eine von Ersterem unterzeichnete und datirte Anweisung.

Im Fall der Bote zum Abholen von Briefen für mehrere Personen gesandt wird, so muss derselbe den Pass und eine Anweisung für jede Person vorzeigen.

Im Fall der für Briefe sich Meldende ein britischer Unterthan ist, so muss er im Stande sein den Ort oder die Gegend anzugeben, von wo er Briefe erwartet, ehe er dieselben empfangen kann. Unterthanen von Staaten, die keine Pässe ertheilen, werden in dem Verfahren britischen Unterthanen gleich geachtet.

Briefe die einfach nach "London" (und nicht "Post Office," noch "Poste Restante, London"), adressirt sind, werden *in keinem Falle* am Schalter verabfolgt, sondern werden durch die Briefträger an die von dem Applicanten ertheilte Adresse abgeliefert.

Auswärtige Briefe mit der Aufschrift "Post Office," oder "Poste Restante, London," werden zwei Monate am Fenster des Post-Amtes aufbewahrt. Inländische Briefe hingegen, nur einen Monat; nach Verlauf dieser Fristen werden beide Klassen von Briefen dem Bureau für unbestellbare Briefe übergeben, und damit auf übliche Weise verfahren.

Ein jeder welcher sich am Post-Amt-Fenster nach Briefen erkundigt, muss zur Abwendung von Irthum

und um die richtige Ueberlieferung an den Eigenthümer des Briefes zu verbürgen, im Stande sein dem Post-Beamten die nöthigen Erläuterungen zu geben.

Wenn Briefe die "Post Office, London," adressirt sind mit den Worten "*To be called for*" (wird abgeholt) mochten versehen werden, so würde darunter das Geschäft des Post-Amtes erheblich erleichtert werden.

Le lettere dei Forestieri indizzate "Londra," "Poste Restante," o "Post Office, London," saranno ritenute due mesi per essere distribuite alla finestra dell'ufficio principale.

Le Lettere interne similmente indizzate saranno ritenute un mese, dopo questo tempo, se non reclamate, saranno mandate al deposito delle Lettere perdute conforme all'ordini della Posta.

Tutti le persone che faranno applicazione per lettere alla finestra dell'ufficio principale dovranno dare ogni spiegazione necessaria all'impiegato affine d'evitare ogni errore, e che ognuno riceva le lettere a lui destinate.

Sarà facilitare la distribuizione delle lettere se le parole in inglese "*To be called for,*" sieno aggiunte all'indirizzo di "Poste Restante, Londra," o "Post Office, London."

## THE GENERAL POST OFFICE,

ST. MARTIN'S-LE-GRAND,

is divided by a Spacious Hall in the Centre.

On entering by the front entrance, facing St. Martin's-le-Grand, on the right hand will be found the Secretary's, Receiver General's, Accountant General's, Dead Letter, Missing Letter, and the London District Offices; on the left, the Inland (Town and Country), Ship Letter, and Foreign Offices.

**NOTICE.**—Lists containing the names on Letters which cannot be delivered for the want of address, are hung up inside the Hall immediately under the Clock; and persons to whom they belong, desirous of receiving them, should fix their full name and address opposite to the same, when they will be delivered on the following morning.

**LETTERS ADDRESSED** — “To be called for,” or “Poste Restante,” can only be retained at the Chief Office, St. Martin's-le-Grand, where they must be applied for.

RATES OF POSTAGE ON INLAND (TOWN AND COUNTRY) CORRESPONDENCE.

LONDON DISPATCH.

INLAND (Town and Country), Colonial, Foreign, and Ship LETTERS must be posted at the Chief Office, before  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 8 in the Morning, and before 6 o'clock in the Evening; and in the Evening at Lombard Street before 7, by affixing the postage and an additional penny in stamps, and at the Chief Office, before 7 in the Evening, upon payment of postage and fee of one penny in money or stamps; and before  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 7 in the Evening upon payment of the postage, and a fee of sixpence in money.

AT THE BRANCH OFFICES — Charing Cross, Old Cavendish Street, and Borough, before 8 o'clock in the Morning, and before 6 in the Evening; and until  $\frac{1}{4}$  before 7 in the Evening by affixing the postage and an additional penny in stamps.

AT THE RECEIVING HOUSES — before a  $\frac{1}{4}$  to 8 in the Morning, and before  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 5 in the Evening, for dispatch the same day in London; in the Evening they may be posted at the Receiving Houses until 6 o'clock, by affixing the postage and an additional penny in stamps.

NEWSPAPERS — should be posted at the Chief Office before 6 o'clock in the Evening, and until  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 7 with a fee of one half-penny each; and at Lombard Street before  $\frac{1}{4}$  to 8 in the Evening.

AT THE BRANCH OFFICES — before  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 7 in the Morning, and  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 5 in the Evening; and

AT THE RECEIVING HOUSES — before 7 in the Morning, and 5 in the Evening.

---

SOLDIERS' AND SEAMEN'S LETTERS — are charged a postage of one penny, when prepaid and not exceeding half an ounce in weight. — When sent by Private Ship, the gratuity of twopence in addition must be paid.

**LETTERS** — to or from **SOLDIERS** and **SEAMEN** from abroad, when not pre-paid, are charged twopence ; they are also liable to Foreign rates in addition, if sent to or through a Foreign Country, but no further charge upon re-direction.

**NOTICE.**— A Letter, when once posted, cannot be given up to any one but to the person to whom it is addressed.

Letters containing articles of a perishable or dangerous nature, will not be forwarded.

### LONDON DELIVERY.

IN London there are Ten deliveries of Letters daily. At the following places in the Environs of London, and within the circle of Three miles from the Chief Office, there are Six deliveries, viz. :—

There are also from three to five deliveries daily, to places at longer distances.

**MISSING LETTERS** — should be applied for at the Secretary's Office (or by letter addressed to the Official Secretary, General Post Office), giving full name and address of the writer and to whom they are addressed, the day and hour when posted, and by whom posted, and if stamped or paid for in money.

**FOREIGN LETTERS** — arriving between the General Post delivery, are sent out by the London District carriers.

**LETTERS RE-DIRECTED** — are liable to additional rates of postage. Officers' letters, however, which have been charged, or have paid, one Foreign or Colonial rate, are exempt.

## POSTAGE STAMPS.

**STAMPS** may be used to pay postage on Foreign, Colonial, and Ship Letters, and Newspapers. In using them care must be taken that the addition of the Stamps does not increase the weight intended to be paid for, as Colonial, and Foreign Letters in such cases are liable to be detained for postage (where the pre-payment is compulsory), or sent forward charged with the deficiency. Inland Letters (Town and Country) insufficiently stamped, are charged double the deficiency.

Postage of letters cannot be paid for partly by Money and partly by Stamps.

## SALE OF STAMPS AND ENVELOPES.

All Postmasters, Sub-Postmasters, and Receivers sell Stamps at the following rates : —

Penny Labels — *1d.* each

Twopenny do.— *2d.* each

Penny Envelopes— Twenty-four for *2s. 3d.*

There are also provided Stamps of the value of Tenpence and One Shilling, for Colonial, and Foreign Letters. “All Letters should be securely stamped in the right hand corner.”

---

**OVERCHARGE.**—In case of Overcharge the money will be returned at the paid window in St. Martin's-le-Grand, between the hours of Ten and Four; or the letters may be re-sealed and sent by the Letter Carrier, who will obtain the overcharge, provided the fact of overcharge be certified on the letter by the party sending it. As letters are charged by weight, it is necessary in all cases to send the contents (sealed up), as without them it is not possible to settle the question.

**NOTICES OF OBJECTION TO VOTERS** — must be posted half an hour earlier than the ordinary letters, and may be registered for a fee of Twopence.

**DEAD LETTERS**, or letters not delivered for want of correct addresses, or other causes, are sent to the

Dead Letter Office to be opened and returned to the writers.

## REGISTRATION OF LETTERS.

FOREIGN, Colonial, Inland (Town and Country), and Ship Letters, may be registered upon payment of a fee of Sixpence in money, over and above the postage. For France and countries *through* France, Prussia, and countries *through* Prussia, it is necessary to have the Foreign registration fee and postage paid in addition to the British. The French fee is double the Foreign rate, and Prussia is Threepence for a letter of any weight. Registered letters must be posted half an hour previously to the ordinary letters.

## NEWSPAPERS, MAGAZINES, ETC.

NEWSPAPERS.—It is not compulsory to send newspapers by the post, but if so sent, they must be made up in covers open at the sides, and if for Foreign parts must be posted within seven days of publication, have no marks or writing (other than the address, which may be written on the paper, as well as cover) thereon, or anything enclosed, which would subject them to treble-letter postage. British newspapers are forwarded from one part of the kingdom to another free. The paper may be written on, provided a penny stamp is affixed; if, however, such penny stamp be not paid, or the cover written on, then it will be charged at the rate of an unpaid letter, according to weight.



**PRINTED VOTES AND PARLIAMENTARY PROCEEDINGS** are forwarded by post between places in the United Kingdom, and to some Foreign parts, at the following rates : —

Under 4 oz. one penny; above, and under 8 oz., Two-pence; and so on, weight unlimited: pre-payment optional for the United Kingdom and Colonies by Packet.

**MAGAZINES, REVIEWS, PRINTED BOOKS, &c.**, whether Colonial, Foreign, or British, may be sent by post between places in the United Kingdom (made up in the same manner as newspapers), if prepaid in stamps, at the following rates : —

Under 1 lb. *6d.*; under 2 lbs. *1s.*; and *6d.* for every additional lb. (16 oz.).

No two books can be forwarded in one parcel, nor must they exceed 24 inches in length or breadth. They may also be forwarded by Packet, on the same conditions (except that there must be no writing either inside, or on the cover), to Bermuda, British West Indies, Newfoundland, Malta, Gibraltar, and Hong Kong, viâ Southampton, at *6d.* for 8 oz., or double the above rates.

**PARLIAMENTARY NOTICES** — may be sent through the post, provided they be posted, on or before the 12th of December, at the Chief Offices of London,

The words "Parliamentary Notice," must be legibly printed on the face of the letter, the postage must be prepaid in stamps, also a registration fee of 6*d.* (in money) at the time of posting. Duplicate lists of the addresses should be sent, with the notices arranged in the same order as entered on the lists.

### NOTICE OF PENALTIES.

By the 1st Victoria, cap. 36., sec. 2., any person illegally conveying letters incurs a penalty of £5 for every offence, and £100 for every week the practice is continued. The sender also incurs a penalty of £5 for every offence, with full costs of suit.

### LETTER BOXES.

LETTERS would be delivered much earlier at each delivery if the Public would affix Letter Boxes to the outer gate or door of their private residences and official places of business.

See order issued by the Postmaster-general in March last.

## MORNING MAILS.

A LIST OF POST TOWNS in the United Kingdom, to which Letters and Newspapers are forwarded by the Early Morning Mails.

For all the under-mentioned places, the letter boxes at the Receiving Houses will be open till seven, A. M. for newspapers, and forty-five minutes past seven, A. M. for letters; and those at the Branch Offices, Charing Cross, Old Cavendish Street, and the Borough, for newspapers until half-past seven, A. M., and for letters until eight, A. M. At the General Post Office and the Branch Office in Lombard Street, the boxes will close for newspapers at a quarter before eight, A. M., and for letters at half-past eight, A. M.

## MONEY ORDER OFFICE.

THE Chief Office is in Aldersgate Street, nearly opposite the General Post Office, St. Martin's-le-Grand.

Money Orders are issued and paid at the Chief Office in London, at the Branch Offices, Charing Cross, Old Cavendish St., Borough, (and Abchurch Lane, late Lombard Street, for issuing only,) and at the various Receiving Houses within the three mile circle from the Chief Office, and in Dublin and Edinburgh, from 10 till 4 o'clock, and at nearly all other places throughout the kingdom between the hours of 9, A.M. and 6, P.M., except under peculiar circumstances: as, for instance, during the short intervals of time when the Letter Boxes are closed for the receipt of paid letters.

### COMMISSION ON MONEY ORDERS.

The commission charged (on issue) is, for any sum not exceeding £2, 3*d.*; above £2, 6*d.* No order can be issued for more than £5, but any number of Orders may be had, to the amount required to be remitted, in separate Orders of £5 each.

### INSTRUCTIONS.

*Orders issued.* On applying for a Money Order to be issued, be careful to give at the office the correct

christian and surname, address, and occupation of the payee (or party to whom it is to be sent), as well as of the remitter (the person who sends the Order). And be mindful also that the person to whom the Order is sent be acquainted with the full name, address, and occupation of the person sending it.

*Orders Paid.* On presenting an Order for payment be careful to see that it be correctly signed by the payee, and be prepared to answer any questions that may be put as to the name, address, and occupation of the remitter.

*Orders Transferred or Repaid.* The payment of an Order may be transferred, from one town to another, on application being made, in writing (giving the full names of remitter and payee), to the Chief Office of the kingdom in which the Order was issued (London, Dublin, or Edinburgh, as the case may be); or an Order may be repaid to the party who first obtained it, on forwarding proper application for the same, in writing, to the Chief Office of the kingdom in which the Order was issued, giving his full name and address, and that of the payee.

*Duplicate Orders.* In the event of an Order being lost, a duplicate Order will be issued (provided the original Order has not been paid), by an application being forwarded, in writing, to the Chief Office of the kingdom in which the Order was issued, with full explanation of the case, and the name, address, and occupation of the remitter and payee.

## NOTICE.

Payment of an Order must be obtained before the end of the second Calendar Month after that in which it was issued (for instance, if issued in January it must be paid before the end of March), otherwise a new Order will be necessary, for which a second Commission will be charged. And if the Order be not paid before the end of the twelfth Calendar Month after that in which it was issued (for instance, if issued in January and not paid before the end of the next January), all claim to the money will be lost. After once paying a Money Order, by whomsoever presented, the Office will not be liable to any further claim. Full instructions accompany each Order.

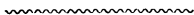

## GREAT YARMOUTH, NORFOLK.

There are, perhaps, few places in the Kingdom that will ultimately derive more permanent advantage from the introduction of Railways than the Town of GREAT YARMOUTH.

Great Yarmouth contains within the Parliamentary Borough a population of 30,000 persons. It is a place of considerable antiquity, and is built in a style which forcibly reminds the Visitor of the Towns in Holland and Belgium, with which part of the Continent there formerly existed a considerable intercourse, which has been revived.

The Sea-View is unrivalled—the number of Vessels which pass *close inshore* being greater than on any other part of the coast.

During the Mackerel and Herring Fisheries, this part of the Coast has a very animated appearance, and the labours of the Fishermen are a constant source of amusement and interest to Visitors.

The Sands are firm and gently shelving, free from rock and mud, perfectly safe for Children, and the best adapted of any around Great Britain for Sea-Bathing, Riding, and Walking.

This place has long been celebrated for the extreme purity and bracing quality of the air: it is found by a recent statistical investigation, that, tested by the relative rate of mortality, the salubrity of Great Yarmouth exceeds that of any other town in the Kingdom, the proportionate annual mortality being one in fifty-six only, whilst that of all England is one in forty-five. The amusements comprise—Regattas, both at Sea and on the neighbouring “Broads,” Fishing, Shooting, and occasional Balls, Concerts, Lectures, and Theatrical Entertainments. Races are held annually at Great Yarmouth, Beccles, and other neighbouring places.

To accommodate the numerous Visitors who now annually resort to Great Yarmouth, Hotels and Lodging-Houses upon an extensive and superior scale have been erected: also for those desirous of becoming Residents, very many desirable Terraces have been completed, which are now letting at very reasonable rates.

The OBJECTS of Interest in the Town and Neighbourhood within the distance of an Excursion are:—

The parish Church of St. Nicholas, a magnificent structure of the thirteenth century; the Column erected to the memory of Lord Nelson; the Jetty; the Victoria Esplanade; the Britannia Terrace; the Race-Course; the Denes; the public Quays, unequalled in the World, in extent or beauty; the Royal Military Lunatic Asylum; Goleston Cliff and Piers; the Roman Camps, called *The Garianonum*, at Burgh Castle, near Yarmouth; the ancient City of Norwich, within the distance of half an hour's ride by Railway, with its Castle, Cathedral, and numerous Churches; and the neighbouring Port of Lowestoft, where extensive Harbour Works have been carried on.

The Rivers Yare, Waveney, and Bure, with the fine expanse of Water called Breydon, afford every facility for Boating; whilst, for Marine Excursions, Yawls of a very superior build are in constant readiness at the Jetty.

N. B. Direct Railway and Telegraphic Communication with all the most important places in the Kingdom. Steamers leave London Bridge every Wednesday and Saturday for Yarmouth, at very low fares.
