Part 1. - Unemployment Insurance and National Health Insurance

Unemployment Insurance.

Two distinct types of National Insurance were introduced in July 1912. Although parts of the same Act of Parliament they did not use the same rules or definitions. For that reason I am treating them separately. This four page summary of the Unemployment Insurance Scheme was published in May 1912.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE.

SUMMARY OF SCHEME.

I.—INTRODUCTION.—The scheme of insurance against unemployment which is contained in Part II. of the National Insurance Act is to be administered by the Board of Trade, and comes into operation on Monday, July 15th, 1912. The object of the scheme is two-fold.

In the first place provision is made for the payment of contributions by all employers and work-people in the trades mentioned below, and for the payment of benefit to the workpeople when unemployed. This part of the scheme is compulsory. In the second place provision is made for the

encouragement of voluntary insurance against unemployment by means of money grants from State funds to associations of persons, in all trades and occupations, which pay out-of-work benefits.

II.—THE COMPULSORILY INSURED TRADES.—On and after Monday, July 15th, 1912, all workpeople (whether men or women) over 16 years of age who are engaged wholly or mainly by way of manual labour in the following trades will be compulsorily insured against unemployment and have contributions towards the Unemployment Fund deducted from their wages:-

(1.) Building; that is to say, the construction, alteration, repair, decoration, or demolition of buildings, including the manufacture of any fittings of wood of a kind commonly made in builders'

workshops or yards.

(2.) Construction of Works; that is to say, the construction, reconstruction or alteration of railroads, docks, harbours, canals, embankments, bridges, piers or other works of construction.

(3.) Shipbuilding; that is to say, the construction, alteration, repair or decoration of ships, boats or other craft by persons not being usually members of a ship's crew, including the manufacture of any fittings of wood of a kind commonly made in a shipbuilding yard.

(4.) Mechanical Engineering; including the manufacture of ordnance and firearms.

(5.) Ironfounding; whether included under the foregoing headings or not.

(6.) Construction of Vehicles; that is to say, the construction, repair, or decoration of vehicles.
(7.) Sawmilling; (including machine woodwork) carried on in connection with any other insured trade or of a kind commonly so carried on.

Foremen other than manual workmen, clerks, indentured apprentices, and persons under 16 years of age are excluded.

Special attention is directed to Section 107 (2) of the Act which provides that-

"In determining any question as to whether any trade in which a workman is or has been employed is an insured trade or not, regard shall be had to the nature of the work in which the workman is engaged rather than to the business of the employer by whom he is employed."

On and after the 15th July, 1912, no employer may engage a workman in one of the insured trades unless the latter holds, or at once applies for, an Unemployment Book. An Unemployment Book can be obtained by making application after 1st June at any Labour Exchange or other Local Office of the Unemployment Fund. For the address of the nearest Labour Exchange or Local Office enquiries should be made after 1st June at any Post Office.

-UMPIRE TO DECIDE DOUBTFUL CASES.—If there is doubt whether any workman is included in one of the insured trades or not, information can be obtained from a Labour Exchange or other Local Office of the Unemployment Fund, and, if an employer or workman so desires, he or his representative can apply, on a form which can be obtained there, to the Umpire for a definite decision.

- (2) CONSTRUCTION OF WORKS; that is to say, the construction, reconstruction, or alteration of railroads, docks, harbours, canals, embankments, bridges, piers or other works of construction.
- (3) SHIPBUILDING; that is to say, the construction, alteration, repair or decoration of ships, hoats or other craft by persons not being usually members of a ship's crew, including the manufacture of any fittings of wood of a kind commonly made in a shipbuilding yard.
- (4) MECHANICAL ENGINEERING, including the MANUFACTURE OF ORDNANCE AND FIREARMS.
- (5) IRONFOUNDING, whether included under the foregoing headings or not.
- (6) CONSTRUCTION OF VEHICLES; that is to say, the construction, repair or decoration of vehicles.
- (7) SAWMILLING (INCLUDING MACHINE WOODWORK) carried on in connection with any other insured trade, or of a kind commonly so carried on.
- N.B.—SPECIAL ATTENTION IS DRAWN TO SECTION 107 (2) OF THE ACT WHICH READS AS FOLLOWS:—"IN DETERMINING ANY QUESTION AS TO WHETHER ANY TRADE IN WHICH A WOREMAN IS OR HAS BEEN EMPLOYED IS AN INSURED TRADE OR NOT, REGARD SHALL BE HAD TO THE NATURE OF THE WORK IN WHICH THE WOREMAN IS FINGAGED, RATHER THAN TO THE BUSINESS OF THE EMPLOYER BY WHOM HE IS EMPLOYED."

CONTRIBUTIONS IN 1912.

The basic weekly contributions were 2½d. from the employer and 2½d. from the employee. This was payable for a period of employment greater than 2 days.

For those between 16 and 18 the weekly contributions were 1d. from the employer and 1d. from the employee.

For a single day or less the contributions were 1d. from the employee and 1d. from the employee.

For from one to two days the contributions were 2d. from the employee and 2d. from the employee.

Payments were made by the employer who fixed stamps into a book, and recovered the employee's contribution as a deduction from his wages..

The penalty for failure to make contributions was £10 plus three times the underpayment up to a maximum of £5.

Only three denominations of stamp were required 2d. 4d. and 5d. but there were situations in which arrears or multiple contributions had to be paid so higher valued overprinted stamps were produced 10d, 1/8d..., 2/2d., 3/4d. and 5/5d.

There was also, later, a penny denomination to make up odd amounts...

Special overprinted stamps for juveniles and adults in casual work were produced for use under Section 99 of the National Insurance Act of 1911.

Unemployment Insurance Stamps of two denominations—2d. and 5d.—are now on sale at all Post Offices in the United Kingdom, and the remaining denomination—4d.—will be issued for sale at all Post Offices at an early date.

Unemployment Insurance Stamps are available solely for payment of contributions for Unemployment Insurance under Part II. of the National Insurance Act, and cannot be used in payment of Health Insurance contributions, or of postal or telegraph charges, or of charges of any other kind.



It was possible for larger employers to pay the Labour Exchange to administer the unemployment insurance scheme for them.

In the most difficult case, common in the ship-building industry, where men were hired on a daily basis by various employers, a complicated system for unemployment insurance was devised.

This was known as "Arrangements under Section 99."

Section 99 unemployment stamps had no denominations but bore an indication of the number of days worked.

Provisions with respect to workmen engaged through labour exchanges.

99.—(1) The Board of Trade may, in such cases and on such conditions as the Board may prescribe, make an arrangement with any employer liable to pay contributions under any part of this Act, whereby, in respect of workmen engaged by him through a labour exchange, or in his employ at the date of such arrangement, the performance of all or any of the duties required under any part of this Act to be performed by the employer in respect of those workmen, whether on his own behalf or on behalf of the workmen, shall be undertaken on behalf of the employer by the labour exchange, and whereby in respect of such workmen different periods of employment, whether of the same workmen or different workmen, may, for the purposes of the employer's contributions under this Part of this Act, but not for the purposes of a refund of any part of the employer's contributions, be treated as a continuous employment of a single workman.

(2) Where any such arrangement has been made, all the periods of employment during which a workman engaged through a labour exchange is employed by one or more employers with whom such an arrangement has been made, may, subject to regulations made by the Board of Trade, on the application of the workman, be treated for the purposes of his contributions under this Part of this Act as a continuous period of employment under one employer, and those regulations may provide for the refund of part of his contributions under this Part of this Act assertionals.

SPECIAL ARRANGEMENTS WITH THE BOARD OF TRADE TO FACILITATE PAYMENT OF CONTRIBUTIONS.

(1) Contributions both under Part I. (Health) and Part II. (Unemployment) of the National Insurance Act are payable by employers as a rule at each payment of wages. For example, where wages are paid weekly contributions must, as a rule, be paid weekly. With a view, however, to avoiding the necessity for such weekly stamping of contribution cards and unemployThis transcript of an official leaflet of August 1912 (published in the book of Employment Exchange Circulars LAB 29/4 pages 81-85) attempts to explain how refunds were made using calculations based on the overprinted stamps. (*Item 8*):

[I have not found any printed references to the Juvenile Stamps or the ordinary stamp overprinted 7 DAYS 7 of which exist as proofs in PIN 10/8, but I did not search diligently]

ARRANGEMENTS UNDER SECTION 99.

Refunds to Workpeople.

Workpeople engaged by employers having arrangements under Section 99 are entitled for the purpose of their contributions to count different periods of employment, whether with the same or with different employers, as a continuous period of employment with one employer (see Regulations 32-34). It may be noted that this provision includes not only workmen casually engaged, but also regular workmen not continuously in actual employment.

It has been decided in this connection-

- (1) That no refunds should be paid before 19th August, but that payments should commence as soon after this date as is practicable. A report upon the working of the system should be made by each Divisional Officer affected as soon after the first payment as possible. This report should include any suggestions which the Divisional Officer can offer for the improvement of the system.
- (2) That no fixed period will be laid down within which alone different periods of employment may be run together.

Refund of part of contributions paid by employer in the case of workmen continuously employed

- 94.—(1) The Board of Trade shall, on the application of any employer made within one month after the termination of any calendar year, or other prescribed period of twelve months, refund to such employer out of the unemployment fund a sum equal to one-third of the contributions (exclusive of any contributions refunded to him under any other provisions of this Part of this Act) paid by him on his own behalf during that period in respect of any workman who has been continuously in his service through the period, and in respect of whom not less than forty-five contributions have been paid during the period.
- (2) For the purpose of meeting any change in the period for which any refund of contributions is to be made under the foregoing provisions of this section, or for the purpose of making provision for any period which may elapse between the date on which contributions commence to be payable under this Part of this Act and the date on which the first period for the refund of contributions under the foregoing provisions of this section commences, the Board of Trade may, so far as necessary for the purpose, apply the provisions of this section to any period less than twelve months, subject to such proportionate reduction of the number of contributions required as they direct, and this section shall take effect as regards any such period of less than twelve months as so applied.

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

WITH REGARD TO

REFUNDS TO EMPLOYERS UNDER SECTION 94.

STATUTORY PROVISIONS.

Section 94 (1).

I. Section 94 (1) of the National Insurance Act, 1911, provides as follows:-

The Board of Trade shall, on the application of any employer made within one month after the termination of any calendar year, or other prescribed period of 12 months, refund to such employer out of the unemployment fund a sum equal to one-third of the contributions (exclusive of any contributions refunded to him under any other provisions of this Part of this Act) paid by him on his own behalf during that period in respect of any workman who has been continuously in his service through the period, and in respect of whom not less than forty-five contributions have been paid during the period.

II. Regulation 23 of the Unemployment Insurance Regulations, 1912, defines the prescribed period of 12 months referred to in Section 94 (1) as follows:-

The period of twelve months within one month of the termination of which an application under Section 94 must be made shall be the period of twelve months ending on the 14th day of July in any year.

CONDITIONS ENTITLING EMPLOYER TO CLAIM REFUND.

Three conditions, all of which must be satisfied.

III. The following conditions must be satisfied in each case :-

(1) Application for a refund must be made within one month after 14th July, 1914, i.e., not later than 14th August, 1914.

(2) Each workman in respect of whom the employer claims a refund must have been continuously in the service of that employer throughout the whole period of 12 months ending on 14th July, 1914.

(3) Not less than 45 contributions must have been properly paid in respect of the workman by the employer claiming the refund during the period of 12 months ending on

14th July, 1914.

All three conditions must be satisfied in each case. Thus, it is not sufficient for the employer to have had the workman continuously in his service throughout the period without having paid at least 45 contributions in respect of him, nor is it sufficient for the employer to have paid 45 contributions or more in respect of the workman during the period without having had him continuously in his service through the period.



Unemployment Books.

There have been many different unemployment books so here I illustrate some examples. I have not seen some of the later ones for Young Men, Young Women or Girls.

This is an Unemployment Book with a purplish-brown cover. [Based on a book in Walsall Local History Centre 170/7] (Item 11):

Upon unemployment the book was lodged at the Labour Exchange and Unemployment Benefit at the rate of 7/- per week was payable after a waiting period of one week and was paid for a maximum of fifteen weeks within any twelve month period.

NOTES AS TO USE OF UNEMPLOYMENT BOOK.

- 1. On obtaining employment in an insured trade the workman must give this book to his employer.
- 2. On becoming unemployed the workman must lodge this book at a Labour Exchange or other Local Office of the Unemployment Fund, and leave it there till he again obtains employment in an insured trade.
- 3. The employer is bound to affix the necessary stamps to this book, and to cancel them as required by Regulation 8 (3) (** back of book); and on recovering the book on the termination of employment the workman should make certain that the necessary stamps have been affixed. His claim to benefit depends upon the number of stamps affixed by his employer.
- 4. No stamps may be affixed for periods during which the workman is unemployed, and any stamps affixed in such circumstances will be disallowed in reckoning benefit.
- 5. For the address of the nearest Labour Exchange or other Local Office Inquire at any Post Office.







Juvenile Unemployment book used with Section 99 stamps.

The contributor, Bertie Charles Cannell of 14 Alston Road, Ipswich, date of birth 24th September 1896, was a Motor Fitter who probably ceased employment when he enlisted in the Royal Garrison Artillery. He was Member No. 870 of *the Ipswich Sons of Temperance Registered Approved Society (No. 417)* for Health Insurance.

The Unemployment book shows that *Juvenile* meant under 18. The Section 99 stamps were affixed to ordinary unemployment books at six monthly intervals and not week by week as the torn stamps at the bottom right hand corner of the first page had been se tenant. (*Item 13*):








Unemployment Book for a juvenile 9th July 1914 to 17th July 1915.

EXTRACTS FROM THE REGULATIONS.

EXTRACTS FROM THE REGULATIONS.

8.—(1) For the purpose of making the proper payments required to be made by an employer in respect of contributions under Part II. of the Act, the employer shall, on or before the first payment of wages to a workman, and on or before each subsequent payment of wages in respect of the employment, affix to the book stamps of such value as may be necessary to make the total value of all stamps so affixed equal to the following amounts:—

(i) In the case of a workman not below the age of eighteen—

For every period of employment in respect of which wages are payable—

if exceeding two days but not exceeding one week. 5d.

Exceeding one day but not exceeding two days. 4d.

Not exceeding one day but not age of eighteen—

For every period of employment in respect of which wards are payable not exceeding one week. 2d.

Provided that—

(a) on the termination of employment, whether or not any wages

(a) on the termination of employment, whether or not any wages are then paid, stamps shall be affixed by the employer in respect of any part of the period of employment in respect of which stamps have not a eady been affixed; and

There was another kind of Unemployment Book, that in which a Labour Exchange could record the details of those who received Unemployment Benefit. It consisted of a book made up from identical, un-numbered pages. This blank page, based on a book kept by the Labour Exchange at 71 Manchester Road, Nelson in Lancashire seems to be industry specific. There were no entries made for the years 1915 to 1918 inclusive which suggests that there was full employment.

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

Issue and Use of a new Unemployment Book called the Unemployment (Casual Employment) Book.

- 1. Representations have been made to the Department by employers, trade unions and insured contributors to the effect that, in respect of persons who ordinarily follow casual or intermittent employments, the procedure whereby the insured contributor's regular book is lodged at a Local Office when a claim to benefit is made, results in the claimant not being able to obtain casual employment or prevents the employer from making proper contributions to the Unemployment Fund in respect of employees whom he engages casually without obtaining the regular book.
- 2. It has been decided, therefore, to issue a new form of unemployment book with the official title of the Unemployment (Casual Employment) Book. Supplies are being printed and will be distributed to all Local Offices as soon as received. In these instructions the new book is referred to as the Casual Employment Book.
- 3. The form of the book provides not only for the payment of contributions (four stamp spaces being given for that purpose), but also spaces in which the employer is requested to mark the days in each of four calendar weeks during which the insured contributor is employed. In order to bring the new procedure to the notice of employers a special letter has been prepared (see Appendix). A copy of this letter should be sent by Exchange and Branch Managers to each employer in their respective areas who is known to employ workers easually or intermittently.
- 4. Issue.—The Casual Employment Book is to be issued only to persons who have made a claim to benefit and who ordinarily follow, or who at the time when the claim to benefit is made, are, in fact, following a casual or intermittent occupation. The

LABOUR EXERGENCY EXPANDITURE COMMITTEE.

PROPOSAL.

To "write off" and charge to the Lesses Subhead of the Vote for the Hinistry of Labour the sum of .5530.15.10d. representing losses by fraud in connection with claims to benefit originated at the Canute Road Sub-Office of the Southampton Employment Exchange.

- 1. In November, 1924, a clerk at the Southampton Exchange reported that he was not satisfied with the authenticity of a claim on which he was computing benefit. The authorisation was repudiated by the Local Authorising Officer, and the Manager made a preliminary investigation into the suspected fraud.
- 2. In the middle of December, 1924, the Hanager reported the matter to the Divisional Controller and a Joint Investigation was commenced. The investigation lasted until about the middle of September, 1925, the co-operation of the Solicitor, a handwriting expert and the police being necessary to unravel the intricacies of a series of complicated frauds which had occurred in the period September, 1932, to November, 1934.
- 3. The methods adopted by the perpetrators appear to have included :-
- (a) the creation of ledger accounts in respect of fictitious persons by means of forged applications for unemployment books.
- (b) The erasure of particulars from genuine Unemployment Books properly stamped and the insortion of fictitious particulars to correspond with the fraudulent Ledgor accounts.
- (c) The preparation of fictitious claims to benefit, the forgery of authorisations thereon, the inclusion of such claims with genuine claims passed forward for computation and the withdrawal of the claims after pay sheets and receipt forms had been written up.
- (d) The insertion of the fictiticus names as signatures on the receipt forms, the forgery of the signature clerk's initials thereon and the engagement of outside confederates to present the receipt forms for payment.
- 4. The investigation was hampered by the wholesale dostruction of documents (presumably by persons incriminated) and, in the interests of economy, was confined to cases



These stamps will, for the present, be of the same design as the current Unemployment Insurance Stamps, but the word "Agriculture" will be overprinted on each, and the value will be shown in black in a white circle.

A revised print of the requisition form used for obtaining Insurance stamps from the Stores Department, P 940G—(P 940(s)G for Scotland)—showing the new denominations of agricultural stamps, is being distributed by the Stores Department from the Mount Pleasant Depôt and Russell Road Depôt, Edinburgh. The following forms and records are also being revised—P 19B, P 88B, P 119B, P 210W, P 265G, P 383W, P 396W, P 441G, P 456G, P 658G, P 889W, P 1035B, P 1060G, P 2011W, P 2100W, P 2045W. On receipt of the revised prints, any copies of the old prints on hand should be made waste.

Postmasters who will require supplies of the Agricultural stamps should requisition them through the usual channels. Offices which obtain their supplies from the Stores Department, London or Edinburgh, should forward separate requisitions not later than the 16th of April. If the new requisition form is not available, the old form, suitably amended, should be used; but, in either case, the requisition should be clearly marked at the head "Agriculture". No other Items should be included on the requisition.

Head Postmasters have already been circularised with a view to their ascertaining from local Employment Exchanges the quantities of these stamps which may be required at the Offices under their control, and their requisitions should be based on the information which they will have obtained. The quantities included in the initial demands should be those which it is estimated will be sufficient for two months. The sales during this period should be carefully noted, so that they may be used as a basis upon which to frame future requisitions. Where the quantities required are small, half or even quarter sheets may be requisitioned; and where the demand is very small, as will be the case in regard to the 41d., 31d., 2d., 11d., and especially, 1d. stamps, requisitions for multiples of 12 will be accepted.

In meeting demands from the public for these stamps the instructions in Post Office Rules, C.f. 23 (b).

should be observed.

The stamps will be despatched to Head Postmasters in England (except London), Wales and Northern Ireland on the 29th of April, and to Head Postmasters in Scotland so as to reach them on or before that date. Head Postmasters, except in London, should arrange for the necessary distribution to the Branch and Sub-Offices under their control, having determined beforehand what quantities, if any, should be supplied to those Offices.





I think the four categories of unemployed person paid with a brown stamp (4d by men and 2d by boys, girls and women) but each of the four categories of employed person paid with a red stamp which included both a contribution to the General Unemployment Fund and the levy for the Unemployed Workers' Dependants Fund which posed an accounting problem for the Ministry of Labour and the Treasury.

This correspondence between H. L. M. Bebb of the Ministry of Labour and F. Phillips of the Treasury during the second week of November 1921 shows how they eventually came up with a mathematical formula to overcome the difficulty. (*Item 42*):

Dear Phillips,

With regard to clause 2(1) and 2(2) of the Unemployed Workers' Dependants (Temporary Provision) Act I mentioned to you the other day - and I rather gathered that you saw no objection to the proposal - that we are very anxious to keep a clean line week by week in regard to cash, and month by month in regard to sales accounts between the Unemployment Fund and the Unemployed Workers' Dependants Fund.

What we propose is as follows. We know that at the beginning of November that there are X unemployed men and Y unemployed women, boys and girls. If we deduct these figures from the total number of insured men and insured women, boys and girls respectively (including the special scheme) we shall get a figure representing separately the number of men and the number of women, boys and girls who will be paying contributions.

Men will be paying contributions at the rate of nineteen pence, being fifteen pence insurance and fourpence levy.

Women will be paying contributions at fifteen pence, being thirteen pence insurance and two pence levy.

Boys will be paying contributions at ninepence halfpenny, being sevenpence halfpenny insurance and twopence levy.

Girls will be paying contributions at eightpence halfpenny, being sixpence halfpenny incurance and twopence levy.

I want to take the fraction which this calculation will give and apply it to the sales of stamps and cash /receipts

Half-yearly or Quarterly Stamping of Unemployment Cards.

This four page leaflet of 1928 Ref: PIN7/92 describes the arrangement for half-yearly and quarterly stamping of Cards. (*Item 43*):

MINISTRY OF LABOUR.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACTS, 1920 to 1927.

Half-Yearly or Quarterly Stamping of Unemployment Books.

The arrangements set out below apply only to employees in Great Britain. As regards employees in Northern Ireland see note at the end of this memorandum.

GENERAL.

- 1. The Minister of Labour is prepared to consider applications from employers for permission to adopt an arrangement by which they may stamp the Unemployment Books of their regular employees at half-yearly or quarterly intervals. The Minister reserves the right to withhold permission in any particular case.
- 2. The minimum deposit which can be received from employers under this special arrangement will be in respect of 100 employees. Where the number of employees is less than 100, applications to adopt Methods 1, 2 or 4 (but not 3 or 5) (see para. 9) will be considered, providing the employer is willing to make deposits in respect of 100.
- 3. The arrangement must be applicable to all regular employees in respect of whom contributions are payable by the employer under the Acts.
- 4. The employer must keep such records as will readily show, week by week, as regards employees to whom the arrangement applies, the contributions payable, and the reason for the non-payment in weeks where no contribution is payable.
- 5. If at any time it is found upon inspection that the number of books in the custody of the employer on which stamps have not been affixed at the due date exceeds the number of employees in respect of whom the arrangment was made, the permission of the Minister for half-yearly or quarterly stamping will forthwith be withdrawn.
- 6. An employer desiring to adopt an arrangement for the half-yearly or quarterly stamping of the Unemployment Books of his employees should complete and sign the form of application enclosed, and return it, together with the first deposit (see para. 7 below), to the Ministry of Iabour, Employment and Insurance Department, Montagu House, London, S.W.1., in an envelope marked "Stamping Arrangement".
- 7. The employer will be required to deposit with the Minister, either in one sum or by instalments, an amount sufficient to cover the contributions for the quarter or half year in respect of the maximum number of employees to whom the arrangement applies. For the purpose of calculating the deposit, contributions should be reckoned to be payable at the full rate of 1s. 3d. per week for men or 1s. 1d. per week for women, whether adults, young persons or juveniles.
- S. (a) The expression "Quarter" in these rules means a period of thirteen (in some cases fourteen) weeks ending on the Sunday next before the first Monday in April, the first Monday in July, the first Monday in October, or the first Monday in January.
- (In The expression "Half-Year" means any period of twenty-six (or twenty-seven) weeks ending on the Sunday next before the first Monday in January.

ALTERNATIVE METHODS.

9. The methods by which the deposits may be made are as follows:-

Method 1.—Applicable in all cases.—The employer may deposit not later than four days before the first pay day in the quarter or half-year an amount sufficient to cover the contributions payable during the quarter or half-year, in respect of the maximum number of employees to whom the arrangement applies.

In paragraph 17 of this leaflet it mentions that official labels bearing the words *No Contribution Payable* could be supplied.

The only labels I have seen which fit this description do not look very 'official'. The typesetting and perforating are crude and they are on unwatermarked gummed paper, They are in the format of the Health & Pensions stamps and are mentioned in Roger Booth's Catalogue as having been used between 1945 and 1948. Use of Franking Machines.

In 1926 it was suggested that money might be saved if firms and Employment Exchanges could hire franking machines to stamp cards instead of using adhesive stamps. There was much correspondence with the firm Neopost who designed a machine for this purpose. The Ministry was very slow to make up its mind and they were worried about forgery.

Experimental impressions of such a franking mark were made on 18th January 1927 and as a safeguard against forgery the value tablet was embossed.

Forgery was not the only problem with Insurance Stamps as this press cutting from the Sunday Express of 15th July 1928 indicates.

"WASHING" STAMPS.

POLICE STORY OF FINDS IN A BEDROOM.

Eight hundred unemployment insurance stamps, which, it was alleged, had been fraudulently mutilated, figured in an accusation at Oldstreet yesterday against Judah Bogard, aged twenty-seven, a photographer, and Martin Beckett, aged twenty-seven, a canvasser

Detective Sergennt Halliday said that he went with other policemen to Bullen House. Bethnal Green, and on the floor of a bedroom occupied by Bugard found four sheets of paper on which were a quantity of meniployment insurance stamps which had been through a process of washing, and from which the cancellation marks had been

Thirteen bottles containing liquids for removing ink were on a table. There were also 416 unemployment insurance cards on the bed, containing 21,833 cancelled stamps

It was at about this time that a franking machine suitable for use with Insurance stamps was perfected. This is an early example of a franking mark prepared by Neopost for the Ministry. The white frame of the value panel is embossed. Ref: PIN 7/192

Cards Bearing Impressed Stamps.

[Section 8(1)(a); Contributory Pensions Act, 1929, Section 25; Collectn. of Contbns. Regns., 1932, Art. 9.]

196. Employers are also allowed, under certain conditions, to use approved machines for impressing stamps on cards, and Societies may therefore receive cards bearing impressed stamps instead of the

ordinary adhesive stamps.

The impressed stamps are of the same colours as the corresponding adhesive stamps and of a similar, though slightly simplified, design. Although the impressions are designed to be as distinct as possible from "franks," there is some risk of the two kinds of impressions being confused at a superficial glance and care in this matter is

therefore necessary.

The ordinary contribution cards are used for stamp-impressing, and are issued by and surrendered to Societies in the normal manner, but the conditions upon which machines may be used include a provision that before a card bearing impressed stamps is returned to an insured person by his employer, the card must have been produced and date-stamped at the appropriate Post Office. This condition applies not only to employees who remain in the same employment to the end of the half-year but also to those who leave the employment—or attain the age of 65—during the half-year.

The date-stamping of impressed cards at the Post Office is an important feature of the safeguards which are applied in connection with the use of stamp-impressing machines, and Societies should refer at once to the Central Department any impressed cards not bearing

a Post Office date-stamp.

II.—PROOF OF GENUINE UNEMPLOYMENT. [Sections 15 (4) and 132 (1 a).]

Franking Arrangements.

733. The normal method of obtaining evidence of genuine unemployment (i.e., of having been "available for but unable to obtain employment ") is by registration at an Employment Exchange, or other Local Office of the Ministry of Labour, where an employed contributor can have his health insurance contribution card franked for each contribution week (Monday to Sunday) during the whole of which he proves that he was available for but unable to obtain employment within the meaning of the Acts. Full information as to the procedure to be followed is given in posters which are exhibited at Employment Exchanges and Local Offices of the Ministry of Labour. In order to take advantage of these arrangements, the insured person must follow the procedure in force at the particular Exchange or Office concerned, and must attend at the appropriate time to get his contribution card franked. The Ministry of Labour cannot undertake to frank the contribution cards of insured persons who attend at other than the appointed times.

734. In the ordinary case, an insured person who has proved his unemployment for a complete week (Monday to Sunday) can have his card franked for that week on the day appointed for franking (normally Wednesday) in the following week. If he has resumed work and cannot attend on the appointed day, his card will be franked when he attends at the Exchange (normally on Friday evening) to draw the balance of his unemployment benefit.

735. The frank is a stamp impressed on the appropriate week space of the contribution card. The stamp bears at the top the letters "N.H.I." and at the bottom a variable cipher consisting of two letters and a figure, or of a letter and two figures, so that there is a distinction between impressions made at different Exchanges.

736. The franking arrangements are available for employed contributors who are not insurable under the Unemployment Insurance Acts (e.g., agricultural workers or persons employed in private domestic service), or who, though insured under those Acts, are treated as non-claimants for unemployment benefit, provided that they register in person week by week at the Employment Exchange for employment. Such persons should, if they have proved unemployment during the whole of a week (Monday to Sunday), present their cards for franking on the day fixed for their registration in the following week.

737. Every convenient opportunity should be taken by Societies of urging their unemployed members, whether or not they are insured under the Unemployment Insurance Acts, to avail themselves of these arrangements. Thus, rural workers who live within a reasonable distance of an Employment Exchange or other Local Office of the Ministry of Labour, and who are genuinely unemployed, should be encouraged to register for work week by week at the Local Office and to present their contribution cards for franking at the appropriate times.

It would have been very expensive to create separate embossed dies for every value of both Health & Unemployment stamps so it is probable that this or a design similar to it was chosen. However security measures were so good that, although such stamps were used until at least the mid 1950s I have seen no real example. This illustration is taken from printed Neo-post Notepaper.





The same embossed shape making a frame around the value was present on a version of the Health and Pensions stamp was depicted on the same notepaper.
