
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




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1 HE extensive, if not universal approbation, which the general plan of the first Edition of the Scotch Itinerary has received, is highly flattering to the Author, and has induced him to use every exertion to correct and improve that which is now submitted to the Public. In the present Edition, such changes only have been made as appeared necessary for the improvement of that plan, which, it is hoped, is now so far matured as to render the correction of errors and insertion of new Roads, all that will be requisite in future Editions. Resides expunging some old Roads, now superseded by better and more modern ones, and correcting some errors in others, still retained, some good Roads formerly omitted, and several new ones since made, are now inserted. A more ample account of Noblemen and Gentlemen's Seats, with the names of the proprietors, the Post Offices in Scotland, and the Inns which furnish Post-horses and Carriages, for the accommodation of Travellers, are given so far as is known. An Appendix, containing such intelligence as appeared useful or interesting, and a new Index, are also added. These constitute the chief differences, between the former and present Editions of the SCOTCH ITINERARY. The corrections and improvements in this Edition, have been furnished by Gentlemen in various parts of Scotland, whose names, were the Author at liberty to publish them, would do credit to any work, and whose kind assistance he gratefully acknowledges. sufficient to add, that many Gentlemen in the south and south-west districts, spontaneously offered or readily furnished, upon application, every information required. The same acknowledgement is due to Gentlemen in the Counties of Argyll, Aberdeen, Perth, Forfar, Fife, and Stirling, who have, besides correcting former errors, supplied the new roads in their respective districts, with a degree of accuracy which may be relied on. Besides these, every information which could be collected from books, maps, and even casual converation, has been resorted to, for the improvement of the

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Money was never more usefully bestowed. These Reports, so nearly allied to the subject of this work, have been carefully attended to, and every possible use made of them, in this early stage of progress. Many letters have been written to various Gentlemen in the Highlands, and considerable information obtained. Nos. 70. 71. and 72. are minute, and believed to be perfectly accurate. No. 74. is so, in as far as respects the islands of Islay and Jura, (see Appendix Note F. Page 5—7). For the exact number of miles from inversry to Kiels Ferry to Jura, and the objects on the right and left, and from that again to Oban, along the coast, in No. 75. are not so certain; but errors here, it is hoped, will be corrected before another Edition is called for. No. 90. from Fort-Augustus to Inverness, by the north side of the Caledonian Canal, it is hoped, will be found tolerably correct. In the Observations on Nos. 83. 84. &c. it was judged best to acknowledge want of materials, and to solicit the Proprietors for the necessary information. For the other new intended Highland Roads, see App. Note K, Page 10—12.

trysts annually.

By means of the Yorkshire rivers and canals, and that of the Humber to the Trent, it enjoys the trade of many of the northern and midland counties.—The foreign trade is chiefly to the Baltic. No. 53.

BELFAST is at the mouth of the Lagan river, the bottom of Carrickfergus Bay, distant from Carrickfergus 9 miles. It is the chief town in the north of Ireland, for trade and shipping. The town is populous and elegant. Among other beauties, it has a stately stone bridge over the Lagan, of 21 arches, which, with the dead work at each end of the bridge, makes it 2,562 feet long.

NEWRY stands on the side of a steep hill, at the foot of which is the Newry water, over which are 2 stone bridges, and a third bridge over a navigable canal, communicating with Loch Neasir and Carling ford Bay. It is now so much improved in its trade and buildings, that it is the largest town in the county of Down.

DROGHEDA is a well built town, on both sides of the river Boyne. It supplies the neighbouring country, for many miles round, with English coals and heavy goods, and exports grain, the produce of the country. It has also a celebrated school, with a very good endowment.

CLYDE takes its rise from Clydeslaw, in the parish of Crawford, at the head of Lanarkshire. In its course to Glasgow, are three falls called the Falls of Clyde, viz. Bonniton, Corra Linn, and Stonebyres, within a few miles of one another. At Glasgow it becomes navigable. Not a great number of years ago, vessels of 50 or 60 tons were obliged, by sand banks, to lay till next spring tides, within three miles of the Broomilaw. To remedy this, the magistrates of Glasgow procured an Act of Parliament, and agreed with a Mr. Gold-borne to deepen the river: this he effected by drudging, and putting at proper distances jetties on both sides. This first essay succeeding, has from time to time been continued, with such further improvement as additional knowledge showed to be necessary. Of late years, Mr. Spreull, the City Chamberlain, by bending his attention to this useful service, has greatly facilitated the navigation of the river, so much so, that vessels of 150 tons can come up at almost any tide. There are, at present, constant traders from Glasgow to Liverpool, Dublin, Belfast, &c. and some vessels from foreign countries have come to the Broomilaw. From present appearances, there can be no doubt, that if Mr. Spreull continues his operations, he will in a few years give a greater depth of water, to allow vessels of a superior tonnage to come to the Broomilaw, to the benefit of the trade of Glasgow and the adjacent country.

THE new road strikes off from the old, near the south corner of Ardkinglass Parks, Campbell of Ardkinglass, Bart. The Plantations here are extensive, and contain some very old and large trees. The house and offices are new and elegant-from this the road rises gently in an E. S. E. direction. to the top of Tomachrochair, which means the Hangman's Hill. Upon this eminence, nearly in the middle between Lochfine and Lochgoil, the Lairds of Ardkinglass, in more barbarous times, were accustomed to execute criminals, or those whom they chose to consider as such-from this the road descends through Hell's Glen, a deep and narrow valley, shut up on each side by very high and steep mountains. Cold and rain being the two evils which the Highlanders felt most, they imagined that Hell was a dark, cold, bleak, wet, and spouty region-at Monavecadair Bridge on l. a road through Meikle Hell's Glen to Rest and be Thankful, made at the expence of Campbell of Drumsynie—from this the Traveller proceeds through Glengoil, passing the Village of Lochgoilhead and Water of Goil on the l. to Drumsynie, the seat of Campbell of Drumsynie, a new and elegant house and offices, an excellent garden, with extensive and thriving plantations.

No. 71.

AT St. Cathrine's is the Stone Quarry of which the Castle of Inverary is built. The stone, when newly quarried, is soft, but hardens when exposed to the air. It is much used for grates, baker's ovens, &c. and stands the fire better than any free stone. It is of a bluish colour, but when rubbed over with any kind of oil it becomes jet black. The road from St. Cathrine's to Strachur, goes close by the shore of Lochfine, with a row of trees for the greatest part of the road on r .- on l. a great bank of Natural Wood-at Strachur Inn, Strachur Park, Campbell of Strachur. The house is a large modern house, and the policy in great order. It was planned and executed by the late Gen. John Campbell, Col. of the 57th Reg.-from this for 3 m. the road passes through a fine fertile Valley-for other 3 m. along the Banks of Locheckat Whistlefield ascend a hill, about 1 m. before you come to the descent on the other side of the hill, a beautiful and extensive landscape presents itself, Lochlong, part of Dumbartonshire, and several other counties. At Ardintenny is a seat of the E. of Dunmore's, which he has greatly improved and ornamented. He uses it as a summer residence.

N. B. The road to Lochgoilhead, and this to Ardintenny, are parallel roads; the road to Lochgoilhead is but half the length of this, but the navigation to Greenock is long, and, except when there is a leading wind, very uncertain. But, from Ardintenny to Greenock, there is a short and straight

run, and not liable to the casualties of the other.

No. 72.

FROM Inverary to Strachur, see Obs. No. 71.-4 m. fur. Leanach-6 m. fur. at the foot of the hill, lies the rural Seat of Fletcher of Dunoon, which terminates Glendaruel on the east-4 m. fur. the beautiful Seat of Duncan Campbell, Esq. of Glendaruel-2 m. fur. Kilmodan Village, Kirk, and Manse -I m. fur. the new Bridge over the Ruel-on r. road to Otter Ferry-about 11 m. from the New Bridge to the Head of Lochreddan lies the romantic Seat of John Campbell, Esq. of Ormadale-Auchinbreck was the ancient family seat of Sir James Campbell. The Gaelic name, Caolantsnaimh, means the sound, or ferry of swimming-about 2 miles from this lies the Island of Greig, or Ellengreig, at the mouth of Lochreddon, which fills up at spring-tides to Ormadale-2 m. S. E. from Caolantsnaimh lies the elegant Seat of John Campbell, Esq. of Southhall, whose original family title was Ellengriv, from the Island Ellengreig. The Castle of which the E. of Argyll fortified, in 1685, but soon quitted it, and, being pursued, was taken and beheaded at Edinburgh-2 m. from Rothsay Port Banatyne and Ramis Castle.

Old Road.

FROM Inverary to Strachur, see Obs. No. 71.—from this the road goes along the east side of Lochfine to Otter Ferry—about 2 m. from Otter Ferry Otter House—at Otter Ferry the road goes over the hill Bealach an Droighinn, meaning "The Valley of Thorns:" in English, it may be spelled Bellachindriven. The descent from this hill to the New Bridge over the Ruel, is steep—from the New Bridge to Rothsay, see Obs. above.

N. B. Campbelton is a large and flourishing town, and is daily increasing. It has an excellent harbour in the form of a crescent. Here the herring busses rendezvous, the fishery of which is the chief trade of the place. Its vicinity to Ireland and the Clyde is much in its favour. In 1791, the population was 8,700.

No. 74.

To Loch Gilp Inn, see Obs. No. 73.—here the road takes to r.—on the north side of the Crinan Canal at the Inn on r. Askmeel House, and on l. the Crinan Canal until you cross it at the west end.

CRINAN CANAL connects Loch Crinan, an arm of the sea on the west coast of Argyllshire, with Loch Gilp, a branch of Loch Fine. It affords an easy and more safe entrance to Clyde than by the Mull of Kintyre. The whole length is 9 miles. The number of locks are 15. The length of a lock, within gates, is 96 feet; the breadth, at top, 24 feet; the depth, from 22 to 24 feet; the depth of water, 12 feet. After crossing the canal, the road goes between the Sound of Jura on the r. and Loch Swin on l. to Keills.

N. B. For a more particular account of the road from the Crinan Canal to the Islands of Jura and Islay, see App. Note F, illustrated by a map of these Islands.

FROM Glasgow to Inverary, see Obs. No. 69.—about 11½ m. fur. on r. Auchlean House, Campbell, Esq.—2 m. fur. Kilchurn Castle ruins, E. of Bredalbane—1 m. from Bunaw Inverawe House—at Bunaw is an Iron Furnace, erected in 1752, by a Company from Lancashire, where pig is smelted from the Lancashire ore—at this place Lochawe discharges itself into Loch Etive, where there is a considerable salmon fishery—on the r. of Bunaw is Ben Croachan, 4910 feet high—at Connel Ferry is a curious Waterfall in the sea: at spring tides and half ebb, the fall is at least 4 feet; at proper times of the tide, vessels pass with safety to Bunaw—2 m. bey. Connel on r. Dunstafnage Castle, Campbell, Esq. It was formerly a royal residence and burial place of some of the kings of Scotland.

N. B. Oban is now a village of considerable trade, and a port of the Custom-house. It is well situated for trade. It is thought a Royal Dock and Arsenal ought to be erected here, which would be a national advantage. When the Caledonian Canal is finished, it and the Crinan Canal must increase the trade of Oban—for the other road by Portsonachan Ferry, from Inverary by Portsonachan Ferry to Oban is a road carriages frequently go—after crossing the ferry about 1½ m. on r. Kilchranan Kirk—from Kilchranan there is a road over the Moors to Oban, but it is only for foot passengers—at Oban there is a regular ferry to Kerrera, and from thence to Auchnacraig in the Island of Mull—from Oban to Duart Gastle, used as a garrison, is 12 miles.

No. 78.

In the preceding No. 77. it is said, from Oban there is a regular ferry to Kerrera, and from thence to Auchnacraig in Mull—4 m. from Auchnacraig the old Castle of Duart, once the seat of the chief of the clan M'Lean—opposite to Scallastil on the coast of Morvern, is the Castle of Ardsornish, now in ruins, formerly a place of residence of M'Donald, Lord of the Isles—at Arros the ruins of another Castle, which formerly belonged to M'Donald of the Isles—here also, the seat of Maxwell, Esq. factor to the D. of Argyll.

N. B. I hoped by this time to have been enabled to give the new intended route from Auchnacraig to Kintra, near Icolmkill, along the south side of Mull; but the Commissioners on Highland Roads, in their 3d Report to Parliament, 6th August 1807, say, "We feel much concern that we are not able to anounce any progress towards commencing the intended road through the Isle of Mull." This prevents me from being able to incorporate this and other roads in the body, of this work. The reader is referred to App. Note F.

No. 79.

Observations by Inverary.

To Inverary, see Obs. No. 69.—to Connel Ferry, see Obs. No. 77.—at Cragenook is a curious Plumb Pudding Rock—I m. fur. on l. is the ruins of Baregonium, called in some maps the ancient city of Scotland—I m. fur. on l. Lochnell House and Menument—on r. Barcaldin Castle.

The post from Bunaw to Appin goes by the Island Ferry over Lock Etive, and Cregan Ferry over Loch Crearan, which is 4 m. nearer than by Connel and Shean, but only a foot road.

N. B. Lismore (now united to the parish of Appin) was anciently the seat of the Bishop of Argyll. A great part of the Gathedral remains, the Chancel of which is used as the Parish Church. The walls of the Bishop's Castle remains pretty entire. Four miles west from the Cathedral are several vestages of fortified Camps, and an old Castle with a Fosce and Draw-bridge, said to have been erected by the Danes. On the south side of Lismore is a small Island, on which is a curious Rock covered with Ivy, resembling the ruins of an old house.

Observations by Tarbet and Tyndrum.

FROM Glasgow to Tarbet, see Obs. No. 69.—about 3 m. bey. Tarbet Inversed—½ m. fur. Inverseds—about 2 m. fur. Kinmore Point—about 2½ m. fur. Head of Lochlomond—2 m. fur. at Aultarnan Inn enter Perthshire—1 m. fur. Glenfalloch, Campbell, Esq.—6 m. fur. Crianlaroch, where the road from Killin joins this—2 m. fur. on r. Strathfillan Kirk—near Tyndrum on r. Tyndrum House—fur. on l. Lead Mines—6 m. fur. cr. Orchy at the Mill—2 m. fur. at Inverounan on r. Loch Tollio—9 m. fur. King's House Inm—3 m. fur. brings to the foot of Devil's Staircase, but this to be left on the r. and take the road to Glenco—Glenco for its wild and romantic scenery is well worth the attention of Travellers—at Ballabulish on r. Lochleven—by the Ferry over Lochleven is the road now to Fort-William.

N. B. Near the head of Lochleven is a quarry of fine blue slate, and black and white marble, in different parts of this diestrict. For buildings, Castle of Elan Stalker is a ruin of great beauty—the ruins of a chapel dedicated to St. Mungo—Airds is pleasantly situated on Loch Crearan—Inverscalls House, Macdonald of Glenco, and Cameron of Loshiel at Lochiel—the population of the united parishes of Appin and Lismore, in 1790, was 3,526, an increase of 714 since 1755, notwithstanding of numerous emigrations.

It is a thriving place, and seems well situated for the woollen manufacture. Fort-William is a regular fortress at the east end of Loch Linnhe, and is garrisoned by a governor, a fort-major, and a small company of soldiers. Maryburgh and it contains about 1200 inhabitants who at present are chiefly employed in the fisheries.

FROM Fort-William to Coran Ferry is a military road-from the west side of Coran Ferry, the new road under the direction of the Commissioners for Highland Roads and Bridges commences. It passes on from Ardgour to the village of Strontian, in the parish of Ardnamurchan, noted for its Lead Mines, and for a new species of earth called Strontites. It was first discovered in 1790, and since analyzed by Dr. Kirwan and Dr. Hope of Edinburgh. 100 parts of Strontites are composed of 60.21 of pure earth, 30.20 of carbonic acid gas, and 8.59 of water—then by Loch Lunart on the L and Loch Shiel on the r. to Loch Moydart.

N. B. This is all the account that can at present be given of this road, but, it is hoped, the numerous and respectable proprietors will consider it, as promoting their own interest, as well as a duty to the public, to give, as soon as possible, a more accurate account, to supply the defects of this imperfect sketch.

Reay parish is 17 m. long, and from 8 to 9 m. broad. The sea-coast is 9 m. long, comprehending the bays and harbours of Sandside, Bighouse, Portsterry, Halladale, and the promontory of Freegohead. Lord Reay has his title from this district. On the Bay of Tongue is a beautiful seat of Lord Reay, who has an extensive deer forest, supposed to contain 2000 deer. The rocks along the coast are excavated into many caves. Not far from Durness is Cape Wrath. In the parish are several remarkable caves, Smo, or Smoach, is the largest and most magnificent. It is a natural vault 70 yards high, and in some places 100 yards long, a short way within the mouth of the cave is an aperture through which a stream of water descending, forms a subterraneous lake, the extent of which has never been ascertained. A son of L. Reay long since in a boat attempted to discover the extremity, but was obliged to desist, the foul air having extinguished his lights. In this cave is a remarkable echo.

N. B. A correspondent writes, "Scarcely a vestige of the Palace of Scone now remains. Modern taste, worse than Gothic barbarism, has violently demolished this royal residence." However, what is now called the Palace, of which V. Stormont is keeper, stands near what was anciently the residence of the Scottish kings, and place of their coronation. Here stood an Abbey. In the church was the famous stone, said to have served Jacob as his pillow. It was brought to Scone by Kenneth II. and carried to England by Edward I. in 1296, where it continues in Westminster Abbey. The Palace is more remarkable for its strength than elegance. It contains many spacious apartments. The dining-room, drawing-room, and bed-rooms, are ornamented with suitable decorations. The Gallery is 155 feet long, by 18 broad, the ceiling arched,

and covered with paintings in water colours.

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APPENDIX.

NOTE A.

THE FORTH and CLYDE NAVIGATION, or as it is commonly called, The GREAT CANAL, was begun June 10th, 1768, and in 1775 was rendered navigable as far as Stocking-field, the point from which the side-branch to Glasgow goes off. In 1784 the rest of the original plan was begun, and in 1790 was finished, opening a communication from the German to the Atlantic oceans. The whole length is 35 miles, beginning on the Forth at Carron mouth, and ending at Bowling Bay on the Clyde, about 11 miles below Glasgow. The highest point above the level of the sea is 160 feet; 39 locks serve for both the rising and falling: each lock is 74 feet long between the floodgates, and 20 feet broad with 8 feet depth of water.

MONKLAND CANAL.

This Canal was originally intended for conveying coals from the Monkland grounds (which abound in that article) to Glasgow. An act of parliament for making it was obtained in 1770, but the work was not begun till 1782. For some years the nearest landing-place was fully 2 miles distant from Glasgow, but since 1792 it has undergone various improvements. harbour or bason at Glasgow is a little north of the back of the Royal Infirmary. The whole length of the Canal is about 12 miles. At the east end, near Airdrie, are 2 single locks, and at the west end, at Blackhill, are 4 double locks. The length of the upper chamber is 67 feet, and of the under chamber, 76 feet; breadth, 144 feet, with 44 feet depth of water. By these locks the Canal is elevated 113 feet above the Forth and Clyde canal, and 273 above the level of the sea. At the harbour there is a side-cut of about 2 miles, where it joins the Glasgow branch of the Forth and Clyde or Great Canal at Port Dundas. This side-cut serves for the conveyance of coals by lighters to larger vessels loading with coals for Greenock or other places, and also serves as a feeder to the Great Canal.

NOTE B.

The houses, &c. on r. and l. being given as far as the highest of the Falls of Clyde, in Observations No. 25, it remains only in this note to give a short account of these Falls.

1st, STONEBYRES, so called from the neighbouring estate of Stonebyre, belonging to Mr. Vere. To have a proper view of this fall, the approach is by a gravel walk made several years ago by the late Mr. Dale. By this walk you reach the summit of a dreadful precipice, where a full view of the cataract is Here the whole water of Clyde falls with an obtained. impetuous fury. This fall is at least 58 feet, and consists of three cascades, in the ordinary state of the river; but when swoln with rains, it forms a single perpendicular cataract.sensation occasioned by the prospect is more easily conceived than described: the spectator at first sight fancies himself within the vortex of its power, and takes a little time before he recovers from his dread. This fall is the ne plus ultra of the Clyde salmons, as none can possibly get above it, although their endeavours in the spawning season are incessant and amusing.

2d, The next fall is CORRA LINN. This fall has two cascades in the ordinary state of the Clyde river; but when swoln by rain, it, like Stonebyres, forms only one cascade of 80 feet to the bottom, which in falling makes a tremendous noise, and produces a great spray. Above the fall the Clyde is contracted by rocks, but when it reaches the summit of the

fall it rushes down with great fury.

3d, The next fall is BÖNNINGTON. This fall is neither so great nor terrific as either Stonebyres or Corra Linn. The fall of Bonnington is only 27 feet, and has but one cascade. Although this fall is considerable, yet on the minds of those who have first visited Stonebyres and Corra Linn it will make a fainter impression than on those who see Bonnington previous to the others.—Thus, in the distance of a few miles, if the heighths of the falls are accurate, the fall of the Clyde from Bonnington to Stonebyres, with Dundaff Linn, is at least 173 feet.

NEW LANARK VILLAGE and COTTON MILLS were erected by the late David Dale, Esq., who, sometime before his death, sold them to a company under the firm of The Lanark and Chorlton Twist Company, of which Mr. Dale's sonin-law, Mr. Owen, is acting partner. To enjoy the pleasure of this grand scene, on leaving Lanark town take the pathway, and at the distance of ab ut 1 mile you arrive at the brink of the hill, when the village of New Lanark and Cotton Mills burst upon the view of the astonished beholder, lying in the deep valley beneath. The village consists of two broad and regular streets, about 1 mile in length, with good houses, five stories high, for the workers' families. The Cotton Mills lie in the centre of the village, and from their length, heighth, and number of windows, present a pleasant object to the eye. There is also an elegant mansion for the manager's residence. Keeping the banks of the Clyde, cross a subterraneous aqueduct. scooped out of the rock for some hundred yards, through which the water necessary to give motion to the vast mass of machinery is conveyed from the river; -going forward is Dundaff Linn, having a fall of 8 or 10 feet, and soon after, Corra Linn, already described.

NOTE C.

MOFFAT has been long celebrated for its mineral waters. These are of two kinds, sulphuceous and chalybeate: the former has been long called the Moffat well, and is situated about 15 m. from the village, from which there is a good carriage-road, with accommodation at the well while drinking the water. By an accurate analysis made in 1798, a wine galion of the water was found to contain

Of muriate of soda, 36 grains.

... sulphurated hydrogen gas, 10 cubic inches.

The water will not keep, for, though closely corked up, in two or three days it is found to have completely lost its sulphureous smell; it ought, therefore, to be used as soon as possible after being taken from the well. There is also another chalybeate at the end of the town, on the Dumfries road, near Evan bridge, of which a wine gallon contains

Of oxide of iron, . 2 grains.

3 ... azotic gas, ... carbonic acid gas 13 cubic inches.

Another is Hartfell Spaw.

HARTFELL, a mountain in the parish of Moffat, noted for the mineral spring called HARTFELL SPAW. The spring is found at the base of the mountain, in a deep and narrow linn or ravine. By an analysis of the Hartfell Spaw water by Dr. Garnett, it appears, a wine gallon of it contains

Of sulphat of iron, 84 grains.

... sulphat of alumine, 12 do. 5 cubic inches. ... azotic gas, .

15 grains. ... oxide of iron,

with which the sulphuric acid seems to be supersaturated, and which it gradually deposits on exposure to the air, and almost immediately when boiled .- All these minerals are much resorted to, and are famous for their cures in scrophulous, herpetic,. and rheumatic affections.

Note D.

ARDROSSAN HARBOUR is considerably advanced, and when finished its south pier will be 600 yards long, and the north pier 350 yards. The breadth 25 yards, to admit of a street 15 yards or 45 feet in width, leaving 10 yards for ware-The wet dock will contain from 70 to 100 vessels, and the Glasgow and Ardrossan canal will enter at the northeast extremity. Of these piersa considerable part is built, and the rest is going on. To answer this harbour the town of Aidrossan has been laid down on the property of the Earl of Eglinton, on what may be justly called an elegant plan, and in time will form one of the finest villages in Scotland. In this town many A 2


steadings for houses have been feued, and a number of houses have been built. The limits prescribed for notes in this work' does not admit to enlarge on the other advantages of the harbour, such as the dry intended harbour, its safety and secure anchorage ground, its relative situation to many places in Scotland, England, Ireland, and various foreign countries; for these the reader is referred to Mr. Telford's Report, and the annexed maps.


GLASGOW and ARDROSSAN CANAL.-This, according to the present tract proposed will be 31 miles 60 chains. A little south of Tradestown, in the vicinity of Glasgow, where the canal commences, the ground is 38 feet above the level of the Clyde at high water. From Tradestown, it proceeds upon the same level, although sometimes with embankments, and sometimes with deep cutting, for 10 miles, 40 chains, to the village of Johnstone. - At Johnstone it is raised by locks 64 feet to the summit level, which, of course, is 102 feet above the level of Clyde. The canal proceeds at this elevation for 18 miles 40 chains, to opposite Saltcoats, where the descent to the west begins. This descent is 104 feet 6 inches to the harbour of Ardrossan. The number and dimensions of neither the ascending nor descending locks are given. The first part to be undertaken is from Tradestown to Johnstone, and the work is already begun at various places. The depth of water and dimensions of the locks will, very probably, be similar to those of the Monkland canal.

NOTE E.

LOCH LOMOND, for its extent, and the grandeur of its scenery and prospects, is superior to any in Britain. This magnificent expanse of water is at least 25 m. in length, and at the south end from 8 to 10 in breadth; its surface contains upwards of 20,000 acres of water; the depth is various—from 20 to 100 or 120 fathoms. The islands are said to be about 30 in number, only about a third of which, however, are of considerable size. The most important are the property of the Duke of Montrose and Sir James Colquhoun. In Inchmurran the Duke keeps upwards of 200 deer, under the care of a forester or game-keeper who resides here with his family. Some of these islands are inhabited, and contain both pasture and arable ground.

A more charming situation than the environs of this loch or lake is not to be found in Britain. When Dr. Johnson visited it, he exclaimed, "What a place would this be in the neighbourhood of London! the greatest ambition of the rich would be to possess an island and ornament it." It adds greatly to the grandeur of this scene, that the lofty mountain of Benlomond stands on the east side of this loch. Those who ascend this mountain will, in a clear day, with an unclouded sky, have





a prospect which cannot be enjoyed any where else, east, west, south, or north: here are to be seen a number of COUNTIES in Scotland—the Clyde, to the Atlantic ocean—and part of IRELAND. There are several mountains higher than Benlomond, but from their situation, none of them give so enchanting a prospect as may be enjoyed from its summit.

[AT the end of Observations, 69, not only the above brief description was promised, but also observations from Dumbarton to Arrochar by Helensburgh, which could not be given in that No. for want of room. We begin these observations a little west of Dumbarton, where the Luss and Helensburgh roads

shed.]

OBSERVATIONS.

21 m. beyond Dumbarton on r. Arc'och, R. C. Bontine, E.q. -about 1 m. fur. Cardross Villege-on r. the Kirk-1 m. fur. on r. Gileston, General Giles-1 m. fur. on l. Ardarden, Nielson, Esq.—\(\frac{1}{2}\) m. fur. on r. Lileston, Donald, Esq.—a little fur, Keppoch, Ewing, Esq.—on l. Hill of Ardmore, Gen. Giles—1 m. fur. on r. Camis Eskan, Dennistoun, Esq.—\(\frac{1}{2}\) m. fur. on r. Drumfork, now the property of Sir James Colqubounhaving passed Drumfork, on r. is a country road leading to Luss, about 8 m. distance-near this on l. are 3 elegant houses, different proprietors-hard by these is Helensburgh bath, constructed in a grand style. Helensburgh has within these few years increased greatly with new buildings, in a superior style to the former, to afford comfortable lodgings as sea bathing quarters; it is now erected into a burgh of barony, and has 2 baron baillies. Sir James Colquhoun is superior. A quay or harbour being much wanted, Government has lately granted 1500l. for this purpose, on condition that the proprietor, Sir J Colquhoun lays out a similar sum .- 1 m. fur. on r. Ardencapile, Lord John Campbell-on l. Rosneath Castle, D. of Argyle-1 m. from the road at Row Kirk, Ardenconnel, Euchanan, Esq. -2 m. fur. on r. Shandon, Ogilvie, Esq.-at Faslane, Faslane, Colquhoun, bart .- about 3 m. fur. Portincaple ferry - on the height before descending to the ferry, a magnificent view of the open-ing of Lochgoil on the l. and Lochlong on the r.—Castle Carrick just seen on the west of Lochgoil, and the D. of Argyle's Bowling Green on the east-3m. fur. Arrochar Inn-From this to Inverary, see Obs. No. 69.

NOTE F.

In the annexed map of Islay and Jura, the carriage roads are denoted by 2 lines; the dotted are either footpaths or unfinished roads.

ISLAY. From Portaskaig, the port where the weekly packet arrives every Thursday from West Loch Tarbet, and which is also the regular ferry to Jura, the distance to Bridge End is 14 m.—3 m. from Portastaig, about a mile to the r. is a loch

called Finlaggan, (mentioned by Buchanan in his history of Scotland) in which there is a small island, containing the ruins of a building, where an annual council, composed of deputies sent from the other Hebrides, was formerly held for the distribution of justice, &c .- on the left, at the distance of 31 m. are the mines of lead, copper, and manganese, now working-here called a road turns off leading to Lossit, where, on the top of a hill talled Leading to Dunvoraraig, are the remains of an ancient Danish fort: -at Bridge End is the proprietor's house, Campbell, Esq. of Shawfield, called Islay House, and a very good inn for the accommodation of travellers; -at this place the different roads separate. From Bridge-End to Bowmore is 3 m. This is a village containing above 1,500 souls, and has in it several good inns and a large quay for vessels of a small draft of water. From Bowmore to Gaskie the distance is 11 m: Here there is a very good inn, chiefly frequented by seafaring people who come into the harbour of Loudon. From Gaskie to Lagavoulin, a considerable village, the distance is 31 m. Here there is a tolerable inn, and the ruins of an ancient castle called Dunuvaig. From Lagavoulin to Kildakon, to which the road is only his therto catried, the distance is about 6 m. Here is an ancient place of worship, and 2 very fine crosses, with alto relievo figures. On this road, at Kintia, a road turns off leading to Dunaad, a distance of 6 m Here are the ruins of an insulated castle of that name, built upon an almost perpendicular rock 400 feet high. From Bridge-End in the opposite direction the road to Portnahaven is now finished. At Skiba, 8 m. a quay for the reception of vessels of a large depth of water is tobe built, and at Portnahaven, from whence there is a constant communication with the north of Ireland, a distance of 24 m. At Carnaan, 11 m. from Bridge-End, a road turns off to the right leading to Aidneave on the one side, and Killenallean on the other of Loch Gruinart. This is an estuary of the sea, dry at low water, where the last battle of the clans was fought between the MacLeans and MacDonalds, at a place called Ballach Derag. 4 m. from Bridge-End a road turns off, leading to Kilchoman, a distance of 6 m. Here is an ancient place of worship, and the house formerly occupied by MacDonald, King of the Isles.

JURA. The length of this island is about 36 m. and from 5 to 8 m. in breadth. At Keills on the main land, and Lagg in Jura, there are excellent quays, where cattle and carriages can be shipped at any time of the tide and in any weather, and there are also excellent ferry-boats, capable of making a passage in almost any weather. The ferry may be about 8½ m. and the distance at Lagg to the ferry-house at Fiolin opposite to Portaskaig in Islay, is in all 17½ m. From Lagg to the bridge of Tirelagan is a distance of 3 m. and from that to where the road crosses the water of Corran by a bridge of 3 arches, the distance is about 2½ m. Between the above-mentioned points the road passes above the bay of Dalgaul or Lallairdman's bay, as it is called, which is not sufficiently known as one of the most commodious and safe harbours for vessels of any draught of water in any part of the world. After passing the bridge of Corran, the road follows the shore of the small

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A

isles to an excellent inn at Craig House, a distance of 3 m. The Harbour of the Small Isles, (so called from 4 Islands which completely defend it from the swell of the sea in any whod) is at present greatly frequented by merchant vessels who always come to at the south end of the harbour; but the northern part of it, where the water of Corran discharges itself. is both more commodious, and has a sufficient draught of water for vessels of any size, and at the same time the best possible holding ground. From Craig House to the water of Brosdale is a distance of 34 m.-about ½ m. past this you pass the proprietor's house, called Ardfin, Campbell, Esq. of Jura, opposite to which, on Fruich island, are the remains of an ancient fortress formerly occupied by the Danes; here the road leads down to the shore, and follows the west of the sound of Islay to the bridge of Duiskeebeg, a distance in all of 74, and from thence continues along the shore to Feolin, a distance of 11 m.; here there is also an excellent ferry-house and quay for shipping cattle, &c., the distance to Portaskaig being about 1 m.

[The above accounts of the islands of Islay and Jura are given verbatim from the letters of gentlemen nearly allied to the

proprietors, consequently may be relied on as accurate.]

NOTE G.

FYERS or Foyers is a small river noted for the stupendous waterfall of the same name. The river takes its rise amongst the lofty mountains in the parish of Boleskine and Abertarff, and pouring through the vale of Foyers falls into Lochness, nearly in the middle between the eastern and western extremities of that lake. The following is a part of Dr. Garnett's description of the falls of Fyers:- " A little below the fall a " bridge has been thrown over by the proprietor, Fraser of Fyers, from which the fall is seen but in order to obtain a proper view of it, we, with some difficulty, scrambled down the steep banks to the rocks below, where we beheld this romantic scene in perfection. The bridge and rocks formed a fine frame, behind which, at the distance of perhaps 20 yards, appeared the first part of the fall; the second and most important break was a few yards nearer, and the lowest under the arch. By accurate measurement taken according to our guide's account, from the arch of the bridge to the surface of the water, after the lowest part of the fall, 200 feet; beight of the fall, 70 feet. Our next object was the lower fall. When we came to the two rude pillars before-mentioned we left the road and went down the side of the hill. The descent to the point of view is difficult, but we were amply repaid for our trouble. lowing particulars are put down from the information of our guide:

From the top of the rocks to the surface of the water, 470 feet. Height of the fall in one continued stream, 207 From the surface of the smooth water above to the 5

 Down this precipice the river rushes with a noise like thunder into the abyss below, forming an unbroken stream as white as snow. From the violent agitation arises a spray which envelopes the spectator, and spreads to a considerable distance. This is undoubtedly one of the highest falls in the world, and the quantity of water is sufficient to give it consequence. The scene is awful and grand. Though an immense quantity falls down the celebrated cascade of Niagara in North America, yet its height is not much more than half the height of this, being only 140 feet."

NOTE H.

CALEDONIAN CANAL.

This splendid national work is now carrying on, under the controul of commissioners appointed by parliament, and the engineer department is directed and occasionally superintended by Messrs. Jessop and Telford. The intention of this grand canal is to open a communication from the German to the Atlantic ocean. It begins at Clachnacarry near Inverness, and ends at Corpach near Fort-William. The whole length is 60 m. 37 chains, being nearly 601 m. of which total length, 37 miles 32 chains pass through Loch Ness, Loch Oich and Loch Lochy, which leaves only 22 m. 74 chains for artificial cutting and Nature seems, by the line of these lochs, to have intended such an opening between the two seas as is now going The summit-level at Loch Oich is only 94 feet above that of the eastern sea at Clachnacarry, and 90 feet above the western at Corpach. The line of the artificial cut from Clachnacarry near Inverness into Loch Ness, is nearly parallel to the line of road, and contains 6 locks: 2 at Clachnacarry, and 4 at Muirtown. A second cut, from the other extremity of Loch-Ness continues the navigation to Loch Oich, and contains 7 locks, which raise the canal to its summit-level. cut, connecting Loch-Oich with Loch-Lochy, has only 1 descending lock. From the west end of Loch-Lochy the fourth and last cut completes the junction of the two seas at Corpach bason: on this cut are 11 locks, making in all 25 locks on the whole length. Each of these locks are to be, within the flood-gates, 170 feet in length, 40 feet in breadth, and 20 feet depth of water, and will admit all vessels to the size of a 32-gun frigate. Excepting the locks the other parts of the artificial canal will be 50 feet wide at the bottom, and 110 feet at the surface; the depth of water being the same as in the locks, 20 feet. From the reports made by the Commissioners the work has hitherto gone on without any unforeseen accident, and is considerably advanced on both ends of the canal. It may therefore reasonably be expected that it will be finished by or near the time prescribed at its commencement, which was 8 years, 4 of which are nearly over.

NOTE I.

WICK is a royal borough containing about 1000 inhabitants. and is governed by a provost and two bailies. About the year 1718 the property and superiority of Wick came into the family of Sinclair of Ulbster. The town is small, and the streets narrow and confined, but there are several buildings, which are a considerable ornament to the place. It is the county town of the shire of Caithness, and the seat of the sheriff court. harbour at present is quite natural, and very inconvenient. veral of the proprietors had it in contemplation to erect a new harbour, and having applied to the commissioners on Highland roads and bridges, &c., Mr. Telford, engineer, was appointed to give a plan and estimate of the expence of building a proper harbour. In his report he estimates the charge in different views: the smallest at 5,890l; the next at 8,520l; and the largest at 12,685l. In 1806 parliament passed "an act for applying certain balances arising from the forfeited estates in Scotland towards making harbours, canals, and other public works there." From these balances government has allowed 7,500L for assisting in building a harbour at Wick, for improving the British fisheries, and for the protection of ressels in the north sea-a protection hitherto much wanted, as many vessels are lost on that coast from the want of a proper harbour to retire The largest of Mr. Telford's estimates, it is hoped, will be adopted, as government has made so liberal an allowance. When this harbour is completed Wick will also receive a considerable addition to its size towards the south, where a new town is to be feued, after a neat and regular plan, on the estate of Sir Benjamin Dunbar of Hempriggs.

Note L.

Tax length of the observations on the roads from Aberdeen to Petersburgh and Fraserburgh not admitting room for the intention of the intended harbours that are proposed to be built at these places, they are therefore reserved for this note, together with a few others which lie off from the Roads traced in this work.

PETERHEAD. A proper HARBOUR for the encouragement of the fishery, and for the protection of ships in the north seas being much needed here, some gentlemen, knowing the importance and necessity of such a harbour, made application for a PLAN, and an estimate of the expence. The plan has been made by Mr. Rennie, and he estimates what is at present to be done at 7800l. Government has allowed 4200l from the funds arising from the forfeited estates in Scotland. The other

FRASERBURGH lies on the side of the German ocean, at Kinnaird's head, county of Aberdeen. It has at present a small harbour, which, though good of its size, is found insufficient for the fisheries on the coast, and for the protection of ships. Mr. Rennie being employed to make plans and estimates, reported that to make a complete HARBOUR would cost 17,726l. But this being too large a sum to be raised at present, Mr. Rennie said that even to do the NORTH-EAST PIER alone would be a very considerable improvement, and cost only 7000l. Of this government has granted 3800l from the funds of the forfeited estates; the remainder to be raised by private subscription.

RURGH HEAD lies on the southern coast of the Murray Frith in Murrayshire, 2 or 3 miles east of Findhorn. A new harbour (probably for the dishery in the Frith) being wanted, application being made, GOVERNMENT has granted, from the funds of the forfeited estates, 2000L, on condition that the proprietors advance an equal sum.

PORT GOWER in Sutherlandshire. A HARBOUR there being found necessary, the estimate given in for it is 1600L one half of which is granted from the funds of the forfeited estates; the other half to be raised by individuals.
