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## EDITORIAL

This issue is devoted to the superb collection formed by Michael Scott-Archer on the "Quartered Circle Stamps" to be found on mail to and from overseas.

Many of the marks are, in collectors jargon "difficult" and the opportunity so generously afforded to see such a collection is greatly appreciated.

The whole collection is for sale at $£ 750$ which affords readers an opportunity to acquire an outstanding study with information derived from many years study.

## THE QUARTERED CIRCLE STAMPS ISSUED TO THE FOREIGN BRANCH 1864-1900

Four sets of stamps were issued at eight to twelve year intervals. The first two sets had interchangeable letters : " $\mathrm{L}^{\prime \prime}$, " $\mathrm{D}^{\prime \prime}$, " $\mathrm{N}^{\prime}$ [ or " $\mathrm{Z}^{"}$ ], though "D" is unrecorded with Set 2. Set 3 only used "L", as far is known, and this letter may have been fixed. Set 4 had two stamps, " $I$ " and " $H^{\prime \prime}$, both fixed.

These stamps had two distinct uses : as bagging stamps for two ports, Devonport and Liverpool and as transit stamps on foreign mail arriving unpaid, or underpaid. By 1864 the bulk of incoming mail arrived fully prepaid, so the use of these stamps with " $N^{\prime \prime}$ [ or " $Z$ " ] code is relatively uncommon and I have only one example of type 2, this in 1874.

This display illustrates all recorded types of use - some are uncommon. Only two of "I" type 4, only one of "N" type 2 and " $\mathrm{H}^{\prime \prime}$ type 4 are known. Two blank centres of type 2 exist - possibly omitted in error. "D" and "L" are less common in red than in black, "N/Z" are recorded only in red " $\mathrm{H}^{\prime \prime}$, "I" and blank seen only in black.

About $10 \%$ of covers to Liverpool for America or Madeira/West Africa have the Bagging Stamp. Possibly it was struck only on the back on the bundle, accompanied - after about 1870 - by the PLO Liverpool Ds [type 51 Robertson]. The "D" stamp on Devonport letters was joined by the dated cape packet/Devonport prior to sailing. Apart from size variations of a minor nature sets 1,2 and 3 differ in the year and month settings only. They are illustrated below ; two indistinguishable examples of types 1 and 2 are in the Post Office Impression Books. I show one of each, only $3 a$ is in the book, $3 b$ is from actual examples. The sizes are outer and the inner circle diameters in millimetres. All were issued to the Foreign Branch.

## BLANK CENTRE Type 2

Two examples only known.
The code letters were interchangeable. At this time the "British and African Steamship Company" was still taking Madeira mails regularly every 6 days and there is no reason to believe these letters did not go from Liverpool.

It is assumed, therefore, the "L" was omitted in error.
London 11th. March, 18751131875 [in black] prepaid $6 d \mathrm{pl} 13$, arriving Madeira 19 th.

London 1st. May, 1875 ? 51875 [in black] prepaid by two 3d pl 17, arriving Madeira $14 t \mathrm{~h}$. May.
Sailings from Liverpool were 6th., 12 th . etc so appears to have been delayed in London for about five days.
