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

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
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#### FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT.

#### TO THE RIGHT HONOURABLE THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HER MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

My Lords.

I HAVE the honour to submit to your Lordships the Forty-sixth Annual Report of the Postmaster-General, being an account of the business of the Department for the year ended the 31st of March 1900.

The whole year fell within the period of office of my predecessor the Duke of Norfolk, whose resignation (in order to proceed with the Imperial Yeomanny to South Africa) was sincerely regretted throughout the Department.

The year was murked by no great changes or striking developements; but the great prosperity of the country and the war in South Africa led to an increase in the work of the Post Office in almost every direction.

It is estimated that the number of postal packets delivered in Appendix A., pp. 23 to 27. the United Kingdom during the year was as follows:—

The number of letters registered in the United Kingdom was Registered 16,250,852, an increase of 6.7 per cent. over the number in letters. the previous year.

In November the limits of size for postcards, both inland and Postcards. foreign, were increased to 51 inches by 31 inches.

The issue of the thin and stout oblong cards, formerly used for the inland service, and of the old foreign postcards, has ceased; and the official cards now on sale at Post Offices are as

Inland thin (single and reply)—5½ by 3½ inches.

Inland stout " " —41 by  $3\frac{1}{2}$  inches (Court size). Foreign thin " " —5 $\frac{1}{2}$  by  $3\frac{1}{2}$  inches.

The private postcards are estimated to be about 58 per cent. of the total number now passing through the post.

Newspapers.

The increase in the number of newspapers sent is beyond recorded precedent. Those posted in London were nearly 18 per cent. more numerous than in the previous year. Not only was there a greater circulation of existing newspapers, but the number of papers placed on the register rose from 2,400 to 2,560.

Parcels.

Of the total number of parcels delivered 64,614,000 were rail borne, while 10,834,000 did not pass over a railway. Inland parcels to the number of 838,113 were registered during the year. Details of the Parcel Post with places abroad will be found on a later page of this Report under the head of "Foreign and Colonial Post."

#### EXPRESS DELIVERY SERVICE.

Statistics.

The total number of express services was 720,381, as compared with 641,227 in 1898-99, an increase of 12:34 per cent. In London 769,764 articles were delivered by express messenger, including 308,058 letters sent out for delivery in advance of the postman.

Service in London on Sunday. The arrangement under which residents in London can obtain delivery of letters on Sunday by special messenger has not been so largely used as was anticipated, the total number of letters so delivered averaging only 59 a Sunday. The arrangement is, however, found useful in emergencies; and a number of people have used it recently to obtain their letters from South Africa when the mail has arrived on Saturday night or on Sunday.

Foreign parcels.

The express delivery system was extended during the year to parcels exchanged with Portugal, Madeira, and the Azores.

#### Undelivered Postal Packets.

The number of undelivered letters returned to this country from abroad rose from 373,308 in 1898-99 to 463,611 in 1899-1900. The increase was largely due to the return of 35,448 letters addressed to the Transvaal and Orange Free State, which were stopped at Cape Town on the outbreak of the war, and were not claimed there by the persons for whom they were intended. Undelivered correspondence for the army in South Africa is also being returned in large quantities.

The total value of property found in undelivered letters, which had to be opened in the Returned Letter Offices, was

725,613*l*.

The articles found loose in the post have increased by nearly 80 per cent. during the last four years. Now that four ounces are carried for 1d., there is a tendency to send light articles by letter post in flimsy covers; and it would be well if the public realised the danger of the contents being lost in such cases, especially when the packets form part of mails which are transferred to or from trains in motion.

The number of postal packets posted without address during the year was 288,667. The number of parcels found in the post without address (having lost in most cases "tie-on" labels) was 14,066. In 2,767 of the unaddressed letters were found cash and bank-notes to the value of 136l., and no less than 9,628l. in bills, cheques, money orders, postal orders, and postage stamps.

#### HOME MAILS.

The Night Mail Service to and from Aberystwyth has been accelerated, with the result that an earlier arrival has been afforded to the extent of about 35 minutes, and a later despatch to the extent of 25 minutes. A sorting tender has been attached to the Night Mail trains over this line, and an improvement of the hours both of despatch and arrival at the places served has consequently been effected.

#### RURAL POSTS.

The extension of the house to house delivery of letters throughout the rural districts has been completed in England, and almost completed in Scotland and Ireland. There are still a few letters in Scotland and Ireland for which a delivery has to be provided, and the necessary arrangements will be made as soon as possible. The letters brought into the official delivery between 22nd June 1897 and 31st March last are estimated to number about 55,000,000 a year.

Authority was given in September for a post office to be established on the remote island of St. Kilda. Owing, however, to the difficulty of communicating with the island, it was not possible to open the office until the present summer.

#### LONDON ARRANGEMENTS.

Private posting boxes.

The reduction of the fees for private posting boxes in London, referred to in the last report, has caused a further increase in the number of such boxes, namely, from 173 to 396.

Sunday registration of letters in London. An arrangement has been made under which letters are accepted for registration on Sundays at certain offices in London on payment of a double registration fee, in addition to the ordinary postage. These letters are included in the Sunday night despatches.

#### FOREIGN AND COLONIAL POST.

New entries into the Postal Union.

Arrangements are in progress for the entry into the Universal Postal Union of Southern Rhodesia and the Bechuanaland and Somaliland Protectorates.

Celebration of 25th Anniversary of Postal Union. Arrangements having been made for a festival to be held at Berne in the summer of 1900 in celebration of the 25th anniversary of the foundation of the Union, Mr. H. Buxton Forman, C.B., and Mr. C. A. King, were appointed to represent this country.

Penny postage within the empire.

The Cape Colony adopted in October last the penny postage scheme, which now only requires the adhesion of Australasia to be practically co-extensive with the British empire.

Packet services.

The revision of the Packet services has been continued, with gain both in economy and efficiency.

Atlantic Mails. Under new contracts for the service to New York, which came into force on the 1st of August 1899, the contractors receive payment at a cheaper rate than that fixed by the last contracts for all correspondence carried in excess of a certain weight, and at a still cheaper rate when the total payment for mails carried has reached a certain limit. The general effect is to provide that increase in the volume of mails shall not entail a proportionate extra cost. The provisions of these contracts will admit of the contents of the mails being sorted during the voyage, should it be considered desirable to do so.

South African Mails.

A new contract made by the Cape Government for the mail service between South Africa and this country will come into force on the 1st of October next. It provides for a course of post between London and Cape Town shorter by over two days than the course of post provided by the present contract. Aithough the new, like the old, is actually a Colonial contract, Her Majesty's Government bears a large share of the cost, and for that reason has stipulated for a leading voice in the arrangements for the service.

Negotiations have been completed with the Pacific Steam South Navigation Company for bringing their service to South American Mails. America under a fixed subsidy, and so avoiding the constant growth of payments as the mails increase in volume. The subsidy will cover not only the present services to Brazil and the River Plate, through the Straits of Magellan to the West Coast of South America, and from Panama down that Coast to Valparaiso, but also an additional service northward to Ocos; and at the same time an improved service will be provided between this country and the Falkland Islands. The settlement of the new contract for the West India service does not fall within the period under review, though it has practically been completed.

Arrangements have been made with the French Post Office Homeward under which certain defects in the train service for the Australian homeward Australian mails through France have been removed. Mails. An improvement has also been effected in the mail service Channel between England and France by the provision of two daily Service. despatches in each direction by way of Folkestone and Boulogne, in addition to the three daily despatches by the route of Dover and Calais.

During the year the new system by which letters can be insured Insurance of against loss, damage or abstraction, has been extended to the letters sent service between the United Kingdom and the under-mentioned abroad. British Possessions: - British Guiana, Ceylon, Falkland Islands, Gambia, Hong Hong, India, Jamaica, Lagos, Newfoundland, St. Helena, Straits Settlements, and Trinidad.

There has been a steady increase in the number of insured letters sent to and received from places abroad. During the first month of the financial year, 248 insured letters were despatched from this country, and 1,641 were received. During the last month 353 insured letters were despatched, and 2.543 were received. The total number of insured letters despatched during the year was 3,687, while 25,276 were received.

No opportunity has occurred of extending the Foreign and Parcel Post. Colonial Parcel Post to any fresh country or colony, but the insurance system connected with it has been extended to Chile, the Danish West Indies, New South Wales, Sarawak, South Australia, Tasmania, and Victoria; while in British East Africa it has been extended to the town of Lamu, and in Southern Nigeria the limit up to which parcels can be insured has been increased from 20l, to 120l.

Payment of Customs charges by the senders.

The system under which the senders of parcels can take on themselves the payment of the Customs duty and other charges levied in the country of destination has been extended to the post with New South Wales, New Zealand, Tasmania, and Victoria. Arrangements were made for reducing from 25 to 10 per cent. the sum which the senders are required to deposit in this country on account of the duty to which their parcels may ultimately become liable, a change which may be expected to add to the popularity of the system; but these arrangements took effect only on the 2nd of April last, on which date also India adopted the system.

Simplification of postage. The uniform triple scale of postage which it was resolved last year to adopt for purcels exchanged by sea between the United Kingdom and various other parts of the British Empire, viz.:—

1s. for a parcel weighing not over 3 lbs.

2s. " over 3 lbs. but not over 7 lbs.

3s. " " , 7 lbs. " 11 lbs

has been extended to Bermuda, Hong Kong, and Jamaica; while the similar scale applicable to the overland service, viâ France, viz.:—

2s. for a parcel weighing not over 3 lbs.

38. " over 3 lbs. but not over 7 lbs.

4s. " " , 7 lbs. " 11 lbs

has been extended to Mauritius and the Seychelles Islands. Reduced rates have also been brought into operation for parcels addressed to Constantinople and Smyrna, viâ France.

The expectation that the adoption of these cheap and simple scales of postage would give an impetus to the Parcel Post with the Colonies appears to have been realised, the increase in the number of parcels sent from this country to those possessions which have adopted the triple scale being at the rate of about 17 per cent., or approximately twice as great as the increase in either of the two previous years. Part of this increase must, however, be set down to other causes, such as the local developement of trade.

A somewhat similar scheme has been adopted for the simplification of the postage on parcels for foreign countries, the multiplicity of the former rates, about 60 in number, being inconvenient.

The result has been that rates which are in every case more convenient and frequently also lower, have already been arranged in the Parcel Post with the under-mentioned countries:—

The total number of parcels sent to and received from abroad Number of during the year was 2,510,615, an increase of about 12 per cent. parcels to on the numbers of the previous year. The parcels sent abroad increased in a considerably larger ratio than those received and from places abroad. This fact, which is contrary to the experience Appendix B., of last year, is to be chiefly attributed to the effects of the pp. 30 to 33. war in South Africa, which led to the despatch from this country of as many as 155,000 parcels for the troops. Large increases occurred in the service with Canada, Germany, Gibraltar, Hong Kong, India, Spain, and the West African Colonies. On the other hand, there was a falling off in the number of parcels sent to Colombia, France, and Holland. The despatch of parcels to the Transvaal and the Orange Free State ceased altogether in October.

According to the Board of Trade Returns, the value of the goods exported and imported by Parcel Post during the last two years was as follows:—

The total number of Foreign and Colonial parcels insured shows an increase of over 21 per cent., being 171,374 (75,279 despatched and 96,095 received), as against 141,475 in the previous year.

In accordance with a precedent which dates from the time of War in South the Crimean war, but was first applied on a fully organised Africa.

basis when an expeditionary force was sent to Egypt in the summer of 1882, an Army Post Office was established for the convenience of the troops at the outset of the present war in South Africa.

The staff consists of 10 officers and 392 men. Their duties include not only the distribution of the whole of the correspondence sent to the troops from this country, but the despatch of mails in the reverse direction, the sale of postage stamps and the sale and payment of British Postal Orders. In the present instance, the operations of the Army Post Office are conducted on a larger scale than on any previous occasion; and I have reason to believe that excellent results have been obtained, notwithstanding the exigencies of the campaign and the vast area over which the troops have been spread.

That the staff has no light task may be judged from the fact that the weekly mails sent to the Army Post Office from this country have sometimes contained over 300,000 letters and nearly 150,000 newspaper packets. The number of parcels sent each week by post to the troops has increased to a very remarkable extent as the war progressed. On the 30th of January the number of parcels sent in a week's mail to the troops was 3,745, by the 31st of March it had risen to 10,783, and by the 12th of May to 19,347. The large amount of correspondence affords an interesting comparison with that sent during the Crimean war. In 1854, when, of course, there was no Parcel Post, it was estimated that during a period of eight months the number of letters despatched to the seat of war was 362,000, as against 345,000 sent home, whereas returns covering a similar period during the South African war show totals of 5,629,938 letters in the outward and 2,731,559 in the homeward direction.

The Army Post Office is assisted in its labours by a postal contingent furnished by the Canadian Government; and the Indian Government has established an Army Post Office of its own for the benefit of the Indian troops serving in Natal.

Special facilities in the matter of postage have been arranged in concert with the War Office, for the benefit of the troops in South Africa. Letters sent home without prepayment by soldiers stationed where English postage stamps are not obtainable have been delivered free of charge, the amount due for postage being made good from army funds.

The war has not been without its effects on the contract packet services of the Department. It was chiefly in the case of the Atlantic services that difficulties arose from some of the fast packets being taken up as transports. On one occasion no mid-week American mail could be despatched, and on four other occasions only those letters could be forwarded on Wednesday which were posted in time for the Germin mail steamer from Southampton. The public, however, has cheer-

fully accepted this as well as other minor inconveniences incidental to the war.

#### MONEY ORDERS.

The following comparative statement of the number and Appendix K., amount of Orders dealt with during the year shows an increase Pp. 64 to 72. in every branch of business:

Ordinary Inland Orders show an increase of 291,582 or Inland 3.8 per cent. in number, and 1,190,944l. or 5.5 per cent. in Orders. amount.

Inland Telegraph Orders again show a large increase, viz., 54,293 or 21 per cent. in number, and 121,014l. or 13.7 per cent. in amount. The total amount of the orders nearly reached 1,000,000l.

The average amount for ordinary Inland Orders was 21.17s. 6d. (or 11d. more than last year) and for Inland

Telegraph Orders 3l. 4s. (or 4s. 1d. less than last year).

Government Orders. The very large increase in Government Orders this year (225,368 or 12 per cent. in number, and 589,315*l.* or 9.4 per cent. in amount) has been almost entirely due to the fact that the War Office has made use of Money Orders to pay the allotments and separation allowances granted to the wives and families of the Army Reservists recalled to the colours in connection with the War in South Africa. These payments commenced with the mobilisation in October last, and from that time to the end of the financial year the amount so paid on behalf of the War Office was no less than 547,887*l*.

Foreign and Colonial Orders. Foreign and Colonial Orders show an increase of 41,015 or 2.3 per cent. in number, and 21,472l. or 4 per cent. in amount. The figures for each country are shown as usual in Appendix K., the most noteworthy feature being the decrease (about 125,000l), in the transactions with the South African Republic and the Orange Free State, the business with which was suspended by the War.

Taking all classes of orders together, the number of orders exceeds 12,000,000 (an increase of over 612,000 or 5.3 per cent.), while the amount exceeds 35,200,000*l*. (an increase of over 1,922,000*l*. or 5.7 per cent.).

Foreign Telegraph Orders. The Foreign Telegraph Money Order Service, which was inaugurated by the opening of an exchange with Germany on the 1st November 1898, has been extended during the year to Austria, Belgium, Holland, Hungary, Luxemburg, Norway, Roumania, and Switzerland.

The number of Telegraph Money Orders issued in this country for places abroad was 1,591, and their total amount was 7,213l. In the opposite direction 2,183 such orders, amounting to 12,576l., were received in the United Kingdom from the foreign countries mentioned.

As an example of the utility of the arrangement, it may be mentioned that one of the earliest Telegraph Orders received from Norway was despatched from Vardo within the Arctic Circle. It was issued at Vardo at 1.25 p.m. on the 11th February, and was delivered in London the same afternoon. An ordinary order advised by post would not at that time of year have been received until twelve days later.

Negotiations for an exchange of Telegraph Money Orders have taken place with France, Italy and Sweden, and it is expected that these countries will take part in the service at an early date. The Danish Post Office has also been approached on the culticat

on the subject.

#### POSTAL ORDERS.

The number of Postal Orders issued during the year was Appendix L., 82,115,674 representing 28,633,884l. The produce of the com-p. 73. mission on these orders was 343,737l. The orders have increased 6.98 per cent. in number and 5.20 per cent. in amount during the year. There has again been a very large increase (17.39 per cent.) in the number of one shilling orders, which have risen in ten years from 7 per cent. to 11 per cent. of the whole

The value of the stamps affixed to Postal Orders by the holders during the year was 186,964l. 8s. 4d.

#### POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

During the year ended the 31st of December 1899, 14,654,609 Appendix J., deposits were made, the total sum deposited being 39,122,160l. pp. 56 to 63. In the same period the withdrawals numbered 5,094,033, the total sum withdrawn being 35,171,475. The interest credited to depositors exceeded 3,000,000l.; and the total sum standing to their credit at the end of the year was 130,118,605. The number of depositors reached 8,000,000, or 1 in 5 of the population of the United Kingdom. The deposits made on the last day of the year numbered 121,978, representing a value of 389,648l. These figures are the highest on record for a single day since the bank was established. The highest amount withdrawn in one day was 201,749l. on the Tuesday after Easter.

The number of withdrawals by telegraph on the day of Telegraphic application was 161,190, nearly 20,000 more than in the previous withdrawals. year. Under the system in which application for the money

is made by telegraph, and the warrant is sent by return of post, there were 11,405 withdrawals, nearly 1,000 more than in the previous year.

Accounts of Societies, &c.

The number of new accounts opened during 1899 for friendly societies was 406; for charitable, provident and trade societies, 2,833; and for penny banks, 262.

Soldiers' accounts.

Under the special arrangements made by the War Office, deferred pay of soldiers leaving the army was received in 16,522 deposits, amounting to 297,787l. During the last three months of the year such deposits almost ceased. On behalf of soldiers stationed abroad, who have accounts in the Post Office Savings Bank, 11,876 deposits, amounting to 15,895l., were received through the War Office.

Accounts of registrars of county courts. The number of accounts opened by registrars of county courts rose from 277 in 1898 to 538 in 1899. The increase was due to the operation of the Workmen's Compensation Act of 1897, under which sums awarded as compensation may be invested in the Post Office Savings Bank. The arrangement has proved so convenient that a Bill has been introduced into Parliament authorising a similar investment of money paid into an English county court in ordinary actions at common law, and ordered to be invested for the benefit of an infant or lunatic.

Investment and sale of stock.

During the year the investments of depositors in Government stock were 26,531, amounting to 1,670,354l.; the sales were 11,789, amounting to 686,135l. The fall in the price of consols which took place in December led to a great increase in the number of purchases of that stock. While the average number of applications for investment is not more than 90 in a day, from the 23rd of December, the day after the price of consols reached 98, to the 11th of January the applications varied between 190 and 832 a day. On the 31st of December there were 78,998 depositors, whose total holding of stock amounted to 8,397,213l.

Annuities and life insurance.

The immediate annuities granted numbered 2,031, amounting to 54,044l. The deferred annuities were 147 in number and 3,085l. in amount. Out of the fund raised by the "Daily Telegraph" for the widows and orphans of soldiers killed in the war, immediate annuities of 15l. were purchased through the Savings Bank in favour of about 250 widows. As regards life insurance, 827 contracts were made in 1899, amounting to 43,723l. Of these, 356 are for the payment of the sum insured at the age of 55.

Expenditure.

The net expenditure of the bank for the year was 473,877l, representing an average cost per transaction of 5.75d. as against 5.77d. in 1898. The rate per cent. of expenses to capital was 7s.  $3\frac{1}{2}d$ . as against 7s.  $3\frac{3}{4}d$ . in 1898. Nearly all the forms required in large quantities for the business of the bank are now printed on the premises, with considerable gain in economy and convenience.

The deficiency on the year's working amounted to 11,711l. Deficiency. This, added to the deficits in the three preceding years, makes an aggregate loss of 34,123l.

The regulations of the Department have been revised, bringing Revised them up to date and introducing certain amendments of detail, regulations. which experience has shown to be desirable. The revised code has been laid on the tables of both Houses of Parliament, as provided by law.

#### TELEGRAPHS.

The number of telegrams sent over the wires of the Depart- Appendix H., ment during the year was 90,415,123, the increase being 3.87 pp. 53 and 54. per cent.

The increase in the number of ordinary Inland telegrams was 2.88 per cent. as compared with 4.95 per cent. for the previous. year, and the increase in revenue was 3.74 per cent., the average value of these telegrams having risen from 7:38d. to 7:44d. The concessions in regard to porterage had influenced the average value and led to a steady decrease in previous years, but the figures for 1899-1900 seem to show that a turning point has been reached.

The number of Foreign telegrams, 7,521,540, is the highest on record, being 7.83 per cent. in excess of the number for the previous year. These figures do not include telegrams handed direct to cable companies or delivered by them without the intervention of the Post Office. The growth is chiefly attributable to activity in Stock Exchange business and to the war in South Africa. Press telegrams show an increase of 9.17 per

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cent, as compared with 3.73 for the previous year. The average weekly number of words in these telegrams was 15,721,802, as compared with a weekly average for the previous year of 14,400,800. The war has given rise to an increase in two ways—(1) the existing newspapers and institutions have taken more news, and (2) nearly 400 additional clubs and institutions have been registered for the receipt of telegrams in connection with arrangements made by the various news agencies for the dissemination of intelligence. The visit of the Australian cricket teams in the summer of last year also gave rise to a considerable amount of press work.

The increase in London local telegrams was 1.35 per cent. the number being 7,941,540 as compared with 7,827,576. It will be seen that, as in the previous year, these telegrams have not increased at the same rate as the general traffic. To some extent this is no doubt due to the competition of the Telephone and Express Messenger Services.

As an instance of the amount of work which may be suddenly thrown upon the Department by an important event, it may be mentioned that on the 1st of March the news of the relief of Ladysmith brought to the Central Telegraph Office about 50,000 telegrams in excess of the average, and that on the same day at the Threadneedle Street Branch Office 7,500 telegrams were handed in between 10 and 11.10 a.m. The sudden influx of work was disposed of by the staff in a most satisfactory manner.

War news on Sunday.

With the view of giving the public the latest official news from the seat of war, which in remote country districts it would be extremely difficult to obtain on Sundays, arrangements were made to forward on that day, to every Telegraph Office in the United Kingdom open for the delivery of telegrams, any important news from the front which might be received from the War Office up to 1.0 a.m. The notifications have been exhibited in the Post Office windows.

Censorship on telegrams to South Africa.

On the 17th November last Her Majesty's Government suspended the transmission of telegrams in code or cipher to all places in East and South Africa, and at the same time established a censorship at Aden on telegrams in plain language. This remained in force until the 2nd of March, when the censorship was relaxed to the extent that telegrams in code to or from Zanzibar, Seychelles, Mauritius, Madagascar, British East Africa, German East Africa, Mozambique, and Lorenço Marques, relating to commercial or private affairs, might be transmitted at the sender's risk on the condition that copies of the codes, with translations of the code words, were deposited with the authorities at Aden, the number of codes permitted being two for each State. Under this arrangement eight codes have been deposited with the censors.

Special facilities for the transmission of telegrams to and Reduced from the members of Her Majesty's Military and Naval Forces rates for in the field in South Africa have been afforded by the liberality soldiers' and of the Eastern Telegraph Company who have constants of the Eastern Telegraph Company, who have generously telegrams. reduced the rate for such telegrams from 4s. to 2s. a word. The average daily number of these reduced-rate telegrams sent to South Africa is 76, while 65 are daily received for distribution in this country. The privilege has recently been extended to telegrams exchanged between South Africa and India and Australasia, and the Company have expressed their willingness to extend it still further.

During the year 372 new telegraph offices were opened, of Telegraph which 17 were at railway stations. The total number of extensions telegraph offices is now 11,188.

and guarantees.

It is interesting to note how recent concessions have affected the number of guarantees entered into by the public. During the six years ended in 1891, the average number of telegraph offices guaranteed each year was 77. In that year the guarantee terms were reduced, with the result that, during the next five years, guarantees rose to an average of 167. In 1897 a further concession was made on the occasion of Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee, the guarantors being now called upon to pay one-half only of any deficiency, instead of the whole, and the consequence has been a still further increase in the number of new offices opened under guarantee, the average for the past two vears being 290.

Under an Act passed in 1891, power was given to local authorities to guarantee telegraph offices. This power has beenextensively used since the Local Government Act of 1894 became operative in England. In 1895, 6.2 per cent. of the guarantors were public authorities, and at the present time the percentage

is 39.7.

The destruction of overhead telegraphs by the great gales and Destruction snowstorms in the middle of February last was without parallel of telegraphs in recent years. The cost of restoring the lines maintained by the Post Office alone was more than 12,000l. Every effort was made to restore communication at the earliest possible moment, but the damage was so widespread and the difficulty in effecting repairs was so much increased by a continuance of the bad weather, that some time necessarily elapsed before the whole system was restored. The districts mainly affected by the storms were the north-east of England and Scotland.

The underground line between London and Birmingham Birmingham —a cable containing 76 telegraph and telephone wires— underground which was mentioned in the report for 1897-98, is now line. practically finished; and as it passes through a part of the country which is more subject to destructive storms than any other, it ought to increase the stability of the whole telegraph

system. It is being supplemented by the reserve overhead wires which, with your Lordships' sanction, are being erected in those parts of the country for the purpose of making good interrupted circuits; and I am considering how far and in what direction I can recommend the construction of additional underground lines.

New circuits
—Inland.

New circuits to meet the pressure of traffic have been provided from London to Bristol, Cardiff, Liverpool, Plymouth, Ipswich, Yarmouth, Folkestone, Tonbridge, Tunbridge Wells, Ascot, Amersham, Buckhurst Hill, Harrow, Bracknell, Maidenhead and Reading; and additional circuits to strengthen the communication between provincial towns have also been provided.

Direct communication with towns on the continent. With the cordial co-operation of the Administrations concerned, direct telegraphic communication has been established between London and Budapest, Lyons, Nice, and Zurich.

New foreign cables.

For the purpose of strengthening communication with South Africa, cables have been laid by the Eastern Telegraph Company from Cape Town to St. Helena, St. Helena to Ascension, and Ascension to St. Vincent (Cape de Verd Islands), where they connect with the existing cable system, thus forming a third alternative route to Cape Town. The company have also laid an additional cable from Gibraltar to Malta and thence to Alexandria.

Coast communications. The system of telegraphic communication between ccastguard and lifeboat stations has been further extended during the year and is now fast approaching completion.

Bicycles.

The use of bicycles for the delivery of telegrams has been further extended, the number at present in use in various parts of the country being 1,141. It is intended eventually to extend their use to all places where they can be advantageously employed.

#### TELEPHONES.

Trunk Wire Service.

The number of Post Offices open for Trunk Telephone business on the 31st March last was 299, an increase of 13 in the year. The trunk lines in use consisted of approximately 68,657 miles of wire, and 7,250 miles of wire were in course of construction.

Out of the sum of 2,300,000*l*. authorised by Parliament for the purchase and development of the trunk system, the expenditure up to the 31st March 1899 may be stated approximately as 1,531,209*l*. The expenditure during the year was approximately 176,968*l*.

and on the 31st March extensions were in progress to Chichester and Horsham. In the cases marked with an asterisk the extension has been guaranteed by the National Telephone Company.

The total number of trunk wire transactions during the year was 8,094,578, or, reckoning each transaction as involving at least two spoken messages, a total number of 16,189,156 (an increase of 14.55 per cent. over that of the preceding year). The revenue was 191,701l. (an increase of 14.44 per cent.), and the average value of each transaction was the same as in the preceding year, viz. 5.68d.

Post Office Exchanges were opened during the year at Local Llantwit Major, Low Fell, and Wallsend, and placed in connec. Exchanges. tion with the trunk system.

The Post Office telephone and private wire system shows a Revenue. general increase, the revenue for the year from this source Appendix N., being 148,200l., as against 142,600l. in the previous year.

The Telegraph Act of 1899 authorised your Lordships to issue The Act of from the Consolidated Fund 2,000,000l. to enable the Post Office 1899. to undertake the establishment of telephone exchanges in London and in other parts of the United Kingdom, in accordance with the recommendations of the Select Committee of 1898. It also empowered the authorities of boroughs and urban districts, when licensed by the Postmaster-General, to work telephone exchanges, to raise money for the purpose of defraying the expenses, and to carry on telephone business outside the limits of their boroughs or districts. The Act also contains provisions dealing with the position of the National Telephone Company in any area in which the local authority obtains a license to carry on telephone business.

Contracts involving the expenditure of more than 500,000l. Establishhave been made, and works necessary for the establishment of ment of a Post Office exchange system in the London area are in pro-exchanges in London. gress. It is expected that the system in the city, and in certain other important districts, will be in working order early next The Corporation of London and the London vestries have been asked for the necessary consents for the disturbance of the roads and streets, and generally speaking they have shown much readiness in co-operating. The inconvenience caused by such extensive operations will no doubt be great, but the vestries have recognised that great advantage is likely to accrue from the establishment of the service, and efforts have been made to meet their wishes and convenience as far as possible.

I have been in correspondence with a number of corporations Municipal on the question of licenses for municipal telephone exchanges. telephones. In many of these cases no decision has yet been arrived at by the local authorities; but a license was granted to the Corporation of Glasgow on the 1st March, and it is anticipated that in several other cases municipal exchanges will shortly be established under licenses.

The total includes 371 additional offices opened during the year. Of the 21,940 offices, 12,995 are open for Money Order and Savings Bank business, and 8,851 for Telegraph business, which is also transacted at 2,337 railway stations.

The number of letter boxes was increased during the year from 31,441 to 32,593.

#### POST OFFICE BUILDINGS.

New post offices.

Seventy-five new Post Offices have been completed during the year, including a new Head Office at Liverpool. which was opened by H.R.H. the Duke of York on the 19th of July. Fifteen Post Office buildings have been enlarged, and 44 are in course of erection and enlargement. The additional cloak rooms and dining rooms provided for the telegraph staff in the General Post Office (West) have effected a great improvement in the accommodation.

A site has been obtained for a new Northern District Office in London. It is intended to erect there also buildings for postal stores now housed at Mount Pleasant.

Expenditure.

The Expenditure out of the Post Office votes for the acquisition of sites and buildings during the year amounted to 153,071*l*.; of this sum 39,254*l*. was spent in London.

The expenditure by the Commissioners of Works and Buildings on the erection and furnishing of new Post Office buildings and on the enlargement and maintenance of existing buildings amounted to 263,705*l*. in Great Britain and 22,081*l*. in Ireland.

#### STAFF.

Appendix F., The total staff of the Post Office on the 31st of March last pp. 45 and 46. numbered 167,070, of whom 91,273 were established officers. This shows an increase in the total of 7,128, and in the number of established officers of 3,152, as compared with the previous year.

The conduct of the staff generally has been good. The number of persons dismissed was 915, an increase of 166 on the previous year. On the other hand, there were fewer cases of punishment by the withdrawal of Good Conduct Stripes.

Apart from the Army Post Office referred to below, about Withdrawals 2,685 servants of the Department have been withdrawn for for service in military service in South Africa as reservists, militia, yeomanry South Africa. or volunteers. These men's places are kept open for them, and the War Office allows the wives of the married men out of army funds a sum equivalent to half the absentees' civil pay in addition to the military separation allowance. In the case of the unmarried men, if there is any balance available between their civil pay and the cost of their substitutes plus their military emoluments, it is paid to them out of Post Office funds.

The Army Post Office Corps, attached to the 24th Middlesex (Post Office) Rifle Volunteer Regiment, which is 111 strong in peace time, has been increased to 336 with 7 officers, and in addition 3 officers and 56 men unconnected with the regiment have been enlisted for one year or the length of the campaign. The reserve of trained telegraphists attached to the regiment above mentioned has been increased from 100 to 216 for service in South Africa, and in addition 44 skilled telegraphists and 50 linemen have been temporarily enlisted. On service these men are attached to the Royal Engineers.

The total number of men withdrawn from the Post Office Staff for service in South Africa is therefore about 3,400.

#### HEALTH OF THE STAFF.

Except for two epidemics of influenza, causing 18 deaths, the health of the staff in 1899 was generally good. In consequence of the presence of scarlet fever in their homes, 1,147 Post Office servants were placed off duty, their work during 20,566 days being lost to the Department.

Medical officers.

Seven additional departmental medical officers have been appointed, bringing the total up to 580 men and 5 women. The total staff under their care numbered 74,998 men (51,808 established and 23,190 unestablished) and 9,307 women (7,486 established and 1,821 unestablished). It is to this staff that the following statistics and those given in the second and third tables of Appendix F. relate.

Sick absence.

The sick absence averaged 7.3 days for each man and 10.8 days for each woman, the figures for 1898 being 6 and 8.8 respectively. Further particulars are given in the following table:—

The number of candidates medically examined for Post Office of candidates. appointments was 6,970, of whom 641 were rejected.

The question of the physical standards to be applied to candidates for Post Office appointments has been under the consideration of a committee, of which Lord Francis Hervey was Chairman, and Sir Dyce Duckworth and Dr. de Havilland Hall were members.

#### FINANCE.

Appendices P. and Q., pp. 78 and 79.

The postal revenue of the year, including the value of services rendered to other Departments, has been 13,394,335l., an increase of 345,018l. on that of the previous year. The postal expenditure has been 9,683,704l., an increase of 493,698l. on that of the previous year. The net profit was thus 3,710,631l., or 134,199l. less than last year.

The telegraph revenue of the year, 3,460,492l., shows an increase of 200,347l., and the telegraph expenditure 3,748,930l.,

an increase of 266,916l. upon the previous year.

The net deficit on telegraphs was thus 288,438l., or 66,569l. more than last year. If allowance be made for interest on the capital—10,868,663l.—created for the purchase of the telegraphs, the deficit on the year is raised to 587,326l.

These figures are, necessarily, partly estimated.

In 1838-99 a uniform scale of Postage was introduced in the Service with the undermentioned British Colonies, Protectorates, &c.—Ascension, Bahamas, Barbados, British East Africa, British Honduras, Beyrout, Ceylon, Constantinople, Cyprus, Falkland Islands, Gibraltar, Leeward Islands, Malta, Newfoundland, Niger Coast Protectorate, St. Holena, Sarawak, Seychelles, Supyrna, Straits Settlements, Tobago, Trinidad, West African Colonies, Windward Islands, Zanzibar. In 1899-1900 the uniform scale was extended to the service with Bermuda, Hong Kong, Jamaica, and Mauritius, and the postage was reduced in the case of parcels exchanged by the overland route with Constantinople and Smyrna. A revision and simplification of the scales of postage in the service with the following foreign countries, &c., was also effected:—Austria-Hungary, Colombia, Eastern Europe, Egypt, French Possessions, German Possessions, Italy, Madeira, Portugal, St. Pierre and Miquelon, Siam, and Switzerland.


