"THE INLAND POST FURTHER AMENDMENT WARRANT, 1892,"
DATED NOVEMBER 8, 1892.†

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this

warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Post-master-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. This warrant may be cited as "The Inland Post Further Amendment Warrant, 1892."

2. This warrant shall be read as one with the Inland Post Warrant, 1892* (herein-after referred to as the "principal warrant"), and the Inland Post Amendment Warrant, 1892.

3. Clause 80 of the principal warrant shall be and the same is hereby repealed, and the following clause shall be and the same is hereby substituted in lieu thereof, namely:—

Compensation for Loss and Damage of Articles in Registered Packets.

"80.—(1.) Subject to the provisions of this warrant if any article of pecuniary value enclosed in, or forming part of, a registered postal packet, be lost or damaged whilst in the custody of the Postmaster-General, the Postmaster-General may pay to any person or persons who may, in the opinion of the Postmaster-General, establish a reasonable claim to compensation (having regard to the nature of the article, the care with which it was packed, and other circumstances) such sum as he may think just: Provided that—

(a.) If only the postage and registration fee payable in respect of the said postal packet have been paid by the sender, the sum paid by way of compensation shall not

exceed the sum of 5l.

(b.) If in addition to the postage and registration fee as aforesaid, the sum of one penny has been paid by the sender in respect of such postal packet the sum paid by way of compensation shall not exceed the sum of 10l.

(c.) If in addition to the postage and registration fee as aforesaid, the sum of twopence has been paid by the sender in respect of such postal packet the sum paid by way of compensation shall not exceed the sum of 15l.

(d.) If in addition to the postage and registration fee as aforesaid the sum of threepence has been paid by the sender in respect of such postal packet the sum paid by way of compensation shall not exceed the sum of 20l.

(e.) If in addition to the postage and registration fee as aforesaid the sum of fourpence has been paid by the sender in respect of such postal packet the sum paid by way of compensation shall not exceed the sum of 25l.

(f.) If in addition to the postage and registration fee as aforesaid the sum of fivepence has been paid by the sender in respect of such postal packet the sum paid by way of compensation shall not exceed the sum of 30l.

(g.) If in addition to the postage and registration fee as aforesaid the sum of sixpence has been paid by the sender in respect of such postal packet, the sum paid by way of compensation shall not exceed the sum of 35l.

(h.) If in addition to the postage and registration fee as aforesaid the sum of sevenpence has been paid by the sender in respect of such postal packet, the sum paid by way of compensation shall not exceed the sum of 40l.

(i.) If in addition to the postage and registration fee as aforesaid the sum of eightpence has been paid by the sender in respect of such postal packet, the sum paid by way of compensation shall not exceed the sum of 45l.

(j.) If in addition to the postage and registration fee as aforesaid the sum of ninepence has been paid by the sender in respect of such postal packet, the sum paid by way of compensation shall not exceed the sum of 50l.

(2.) The compensation payable in respect of a registered parcel shall be in substitution for, and not in addition to, any compensation which would have been payable under this warrant in case the parcel had not been registered.

4. This warrant shall come into operation on the first day of

December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.
