"THE INLAND POST WARRANT, 1892, AMENDMENT WARRANT (No. 3)" DATED MAY 6, 1893.*

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. This Warrant may be cited as the Inland Post Warrant, 1892, Amendment Warrant, No. 3.

2. This Warrant shall be read as one with the Inland Post Warrant, 1892 * (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Warrant"), and all warrants amending the same.

3.—(1.) The term "printing," as used in the definition of a book packet in the principal Warrant, shall, in relation to circulars, be taken to include type-printing after the fashion or in imitation of type-writing, and also the reproduction of type-writing by the mimeograph or any other mechanical process ordinarily used to produce a number of identical copies of written matter.

(2.) Provided that no circular which is reproduced from or produced after the fashion or in imitation of a type written document shall be sent by post as a book packet unless

(a.) Such circular is posted by being handed in at a prescribed

post office; and

(b.) At least 20 copies of such circular precisely identical in all respects are posted at the same time.

(3.) A "prescribed post office" means any post office for the time being appointed by the Postmaster-General as a post office for the purposes of this clause.

4. If any document which is reproduced from or produced after the fashion or in imitation of a type-written document is posted otherwise than as prescribed by this Warrant, such document may either be detained and returned or given up to the sender thereof, or may be forwarded by post as a letter.

5. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of

June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.
