

THE INLAND POST AMENDMENT (No. 7) WARRANT 1934

DATED MAY 31, 1934.

We, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers given to us by the Post Office Acts 1908 to 1920, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of His Majesty's Postmaster General (testified by his signing the same) and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare, as follows:—

1. This Warrant shall be read as one with the Inland Post Warrant 1923 (hereinafter called "the Principal Warrant") and all Warrants amending the same.
2. The following new Regulation shall be inserted in the Principal Warrant after Regulation 23:—

“23A.—(1) The provisions of this Warrant with reference to prepayment of postage shall not apply to postage forward parcels within the meaning of this Regulation, and the postage charged on a postage forward parcel if not prepaid shall be the postage otherwise chargeable thereon together with an additional charge of one halfpenny.

(2) The expression “postage forward parcel” means an inland parcel which

 - (a) is addressed to a person who has made provision to the satisfaction of the Postmaster General for the payment of postage in accordance with the provisions of this Regulation on postage forward parcels received by him; and
 - (b) has a label attached thereto distinguished or marked in such manner as the Postmaster General may direct.”
3. Regulation 56 (Unregistered parcels) of the Principal Warrant shall be read and take effect as though “Three pounds” were substituted for “Two pounds” in the said Regulation.
4. The Warrant shall come into operation on the 1st day of June 1934.
5. This Warrant may be cited as “The Inland Post Amendment (No. 7) Warrant 1934.”
