

## The Inland Post Amendment (No. 1) Warrant 1948.

Made	<i>23rd June 1948</i>
Laid before Parliament	<i>24th June 1948</i>
Coming into force	<i>1st July 1948</i>

We, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers given to us by sections 2, 12 and 82 of the Post Office Act, 1908 and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of His Majesty's Postmaster General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, order, direct and declare as follows:—

1. This Warrant shall be read as one with the Inland Post Warrant, 1947(a), hereinafter called "the principal Warrant".
- 2.—(1) The rates of postage specified in paragraphs 1 and 2 of Part I of the Sixth Schedule to the principal Warrant, being the rates of postage chargeable on letters and postcards posted in any part of the British Islands for transmission to Eire, shall apply to any such letters and postcards which as part of the normal means of transmission are conveyed by air during the whole or part of their course in the post, without any additional postage for conveyance by air.  
(2) Paragraph (B) of Regulation 63 of the principal Warrant and Part II of the Sixth Schedule thereto are hereby revoked.
3. This Warrant may be cited as "The Inland Post Amendment (No. 1) Warrant, 1948".
4. This Warrant shall come into operation on the 1st day of July, 1948.

### EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Warrant, but is intended to indicate its general purport.)

By Paragraph (B) of Regulation 63 of the principal Warrant it is provided that in respect of a letter or postcard posted in Great Britain, the Isle of Man or the Channel Islands for transmission to an address in Eire the sender may request that the letter or card be transmitted by the Air Mail service operating between Liverpool and Dublin and that in such case there shall be charged the additional postage specified in Part II of the Sixth Schedule (namely, 2d. for the first 2 oz., 3d. in respect of a packet weighing over 2 oz. and up to 8 oz. and 3d. for each additional 8 oz. fraction thereof). It has

been decided to convey letters and postcards to Eire by air as part of the normal transmission without any charge of additional postage.
