THE FOREIGN AND COLONIAL POST WARRANT, 1892, AMENDMENT WARRANT (No. 1) DATED JULY 3, 1893.†

the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:-

1. This Warrant may be cited as the Foreign and Colonial Post Warrant, 1892, Amendment Warrant (No. 1).

2. This Warrant shall be read as one with the Foreign and Colonial Post Warrant 1892, therein-after referred to as "the principal Warrant").

There shall be added to clause 19 of the principal Warrant, after sub-clause 4, the following sub-clauses, viz. :-

(5.) containing or bearing any fictitious postage stamp, that is to say, any fac-simile or imitation or representation of any stamp for denoting any rate or duty of passage, including any stamp for denoting a rate or duty of postage of any of Her Majesty's Colonies, or of any foreign country.

(6.) purporting to be prepaid with any postage stamp which has been previously used to prepay any other postal packet.

4. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.
