

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THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT.

TO THE RIGHT HONOURABLE THE LORDS COMMIS-
SIONERS OF HER MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

MY LORDS,

I HAVE the honour to submit to your Lordships the Thirty-sixth Annual Report on the Post Office, being the Report for the year ended the 31st of March 1890.

The following table shows the estimated number of letters, &c. delivered in the United Kingdom during the twelve months ended the 31st of March:—

The number of registered letters was 11,357,935, an increase of 356,850, or at the rate of 3·2 per cent.

Of the total number of letters, &c. delivered, it is thought that about 85·2 per cent. were delivered in England and Wales, 29·8 per cent. being delivered in the London Postal District alone, 9 per cent. in Scotland, and 5·8 per cent. in Ireland.

The practice of sending valentines appears to be diminishing. In 1883 some 2,770,000 valentines passed through the post in London, but in the present year the number was apparently not more than 320,000. On the other hand, the additional work at Christmas is largely on the increase. The fashion of offering prizes for competitions of various kinds amongst the readers of newspapers and magazines gives rise to much correspondence. On the 2nd May 1889 no less than 31,398 post cards were delivered at the office of one magazine, and at another office about half a million post cards were delivered in a single week, one delivery alone comprising 195,250 letters and post cards carried to the office of the magazine in two vans. In another week as many as 118,000 letters were delivered at the office of one journal, and the postage on these letters amounted to about 1,000*l.*

**Returned
Letters.**

It is satisfactory to be able to report that in spite of the continued increase in the number of letters, &c., the number of complaints of lateness in delivery is steadily decreasing. The numbers of letters, &c. dealt with in the various Returned Letter Offices throughout the country were as follows:—

Of the letters returned 119,386 were re-issued to corrected addresses, 5,539,551 were returned to the senders, 214,839 were returned unopened to the Post Offices of foreign countries, and only 437,326 remained which could not be disposed of. Of the parcels dealt with 81,277 were re-issued to corrected addresses or returned to the senders. The number of registered letters dealt with was 191,834, or 2,609 more than in 1888-89, and 32,742 other letters were found to contain articles which rendered registration necessary. About 28,790 letters were posted without any addresses, and of these 1,495 contained cash, bank-notes, and cheques of the value of over 6,000*l.* in all.

Post cards.

On the 1st July 1889 the price of stout post cards was reduced from 7*d.* for a packet of 12 to 6*d.* for a packet of 10.

The reduction in price and the greater convenience of the charge appear to have been much appreciated by the public. Since the change the cheaper stout cards have displaced the cards sold by private stationers at the rate of 13½ millions a year, and the thin official cards at the rate of 16 millions a year. In addition there has been an actual increase in issue at the rate of 19 millions a year, and the total issue of the stout cards since the 1st July 1889 has been at the rate of 112 millions as compared with 64 millions for the previous year.

The number of Post Offices opened during the year was 530, New Offices,
Sites, &c. and the number of public letter boxes has been increased by 873. The total number of Post Offices has thus been raised to 18,359, and the number of letter boxes to 20,827. About 800 additional licenses to sell postage stamps have been issued to private individuals and firms.

The new Head Post Office for the Eastern district of London situated in the Whitechapel Road, and erected at a cost of about 25,000*l.* for the site and building, has been occupied, and New Crown Post Offices have been completed at Aylesbury, Bilston, North Shields, Smethwick, and Carlow. New Sorting Offices also have been built at Liverpool, Ipswich, Acton, Highgate, and Plaistow, and progress has been made with the new buildings at the General Post Office and at the Chief Office of the Savings Bank. The expenditure for the purchase of sites and buildings during the year has amounted to 83,200*l.*, and about 175,000*l.* has been expended in the maintenance and enlargement of existing Post Offices. The corresponding expenditure for these purposes amounted in 1888–89 to about 212,000*l.*

The total number of officers on the permanent establishment Staff. of the Department is 61,054. The number added in the year was 2,658. The number of women included in the total is 4,348, of whom 835 are employed as clerks in the Chief Offices in London, Edinburgh, and Dublin, and 3,513 as counterwomen and telegraphists throughout the United Kingdom.

Besides the foregoing there are about 52,000 other persons employed by Postmasters throughout the United Kingdom in Post Office work. Of these about 15,700 are women.

In London 87 additional outward mails and 40 inward mails New Mails, &c. have been established. The midday mail despatch by the London and South-Western Railway has been considerably improved, with the result that the day deliveries in a large number of towns in the south of England have been accelerated by an hour or more. Additional deliveries and collections have been provided in many of the suburban sub-districts in London and 15 additional direct despatches between one district and another have been established.

Sample Post.

The increase in the number of patterns and samples sent through the post in the course of the year is estimated at about 600,000, an increase of 20 per cent. About 1,000,000 patterns and samples were posted in London, or nearly 63,000 more than in the previous year.

Parcel Post.

The number of Parcels posted has increased in a satisfactory manner. The following table shows the steady growth of this branch of business :—

Foreign and Colonial Mails.

A further reduction has been secured, after protracted negotiations between my Department and the French and Italian Administrations, in the rates payable to those Administrations for the transit by a special train service through France and Italy of the mails between England and the East, and a saving of between 5,000*l.* and 6,000*l.* a year has thus been effected, dating from the 1st January last. This reduction taken together with the reduction effected in 1887 represents a total saving of nearly 26,000*l.* a year without any loss of efficiency. The French administration at the same time agreed to bear the cost of the transfer of the mails from the steamers at Calais, and an additional saving of about 1,000*l.* a year has been made under this head. Under the terms of the Postal Union Convention, the payments made by Foreign Post Offices for closed mails transmitted by English packets to South America have been less than the contract prices paid to the Royal Mail Steamer Packet Company and the Pacific Steam Navigation Company, but I am happy to say that in the early part of last year the two Companies were induced to accept payment at the same rate as that received by my Department, and a loss of some 2,600*l.* a year will thus be avoided in future.

Arrangements for a Mail Service between England and Japan and China through Canada, to which reference was made in my 33rd Annual Report, have been advanced another stage by the settlement of the contracts in July 1889. It is hoped that the service will come into operation in 1891.

The number of parcels despatched from England to foreign countries and to the Colonies, was 673,807 as compared with 552,055, or an increase of 121,852. The number received from abroad was 352,085 as compared with 314,990, or 36,975 more than in 1888-89. The increase in the whole number of Foreign and Colonial parcels dealt with was therefore 158,827, or at the rate of more than 18 per cent. The Parcel Post has in the year 1889-90 been extended to Mauritius, Iceland, the Faroe Isles Samoa, Tonga, Uruguay, Tahiti, Obock, the Argentine Republic, the Congo State, and Gaboon. The postage on parcels to the Cape of Good Hope, Canada, St. Helena, Ascension, Gibraltar, Malta, and Tangiers, has been reduced, and the maximum limit of weight for parcels sent to Canada has been raised from 4 lbs. to 5 lbs.

It is hardly necessary to record that the usual number of Curious incidents. green frogs, leeches, and other creeping things made their appearance upon the Post Office counter, and the only novelty observed amongst dead animals forwarded by Parcel Post was a sucking pig carelessly wrapped in brown paper with both ends open, which passed through the Bath Office, and was delivered to the addressee.

The confidence of the public in the ability of the Post Office to find anyone and to do anything does not appear to diminish. One trustful correspondent at Ludlow addressed a letter thus :—

“To the gentleman who looked at a house near Cleobury
Mortimer a little time ago,
Bilston,
“Staffordshire,”

and left it to the Department to discover this particular individual in a town of 25,000 inhabitants. Within four days of the arrival of the communication the Department succeeded in finding the gentleman and duly delivered the letter.

On another occasion a confident lady of Greenock requested a telegraphist to write out and despatch a message to her home to the effect that she would not return till morning, and handed a large door key to be sent with the message for the benefit of her lodgers. On being informed that the key could not be sent by telegraph she replied that, if the key could not go, there would be no use in sending the message, and the Department was compelled to confess itself beaten.

Foreign and
Colonial
Parcel Post.

In the early part of the year a young man, about 20 years of age, applied to the Post Office at Northampton for a marriage license, stating that he wished to get married without anyone knowing it. Some time elapsed before he could be persuaded that the Post Office could not meet his wishes. He left with feelings of deep disappointment.

Money Orders. The number of Money Order Offices open on the 31st March last was 9,437, showing an increase of 312 in the year.

It is satisfactory to find that the Orders issued in the quarter ended March 31st show an increase of 14,000 in number and of 150,000*l.* in amount over the number and amount for the corresponding quarter last year.

Colonial
Money Orders.**

Arrangements have been made for an exchange of Money Orders between Mombasa and Lamu, Stations of the East African Company, and the United Kingdom. A revised convention with the Empire of Japan has been concluded and direct exchanges arranged with Norway, Roumania, and Tunis. The following were the amounts sent to England last year from various Colonies:—From Australia 356,486*l.*, from British North America 221,573*l.*, from the Cape Colony 142,550*l.*, from India 150,296*l.*, and from the West Indies 202,064*l.* A large proportion of these sums consisted of payments for goods supplied by English tradesmen.

Taking into account the Orders paid in the United Kingdom as well as those issued, the number and amount of the Foreign and Colonial Orders dealt with will be seen to have increased from 1,297,524 and 3,660,403*l.* in 1888-89, to 1,346,394 and 3,832,488*l.* respectively in 1889-90, showing a satisfactory increase of 63,367 in number and 148,218*l.* in amount.

**Official Money
Orders.**

The total number of Money Orders issued for other Government Departments was 1,358,169 and the amount 5,044,469*l.* At the ordinary rates of commission this business would have

added 15,141*l.* to the revenue. The Money Orders issued in payment of Army pensions and reserve pay for the War Office numbered 528,436, of the value of 2,118*l.* 19*s.*, and the number issued for the Admiralty was 203,351, of the value of 916,407*l.* More than half a million Orders also were issued for the various Departments of the Inland Revenue.

On the 2nd September 1889 the issue of Telegraphic Money Orders between London and 17 large towns was begun as an experiment. Between the 2nd September and the 28th February, 2,088 Orders of the value of 8,674*l.* 1*s.* 3*d.* were issued, and on the 1st March the system was extended to all Head and Branch Post Offices in the United Kingdom, with the result that in one week 578 Telegraphic Orders were issued, representing a sum of 1,968*l.* In the month 1,769 Orders were issued amounting to 6,262*l.*

The number of Postal Orders issued in the United Kingdom was 44,712,548 or 4,430,227 more than in the previous year. The value represented by the Orders was 17,737,802*l.*, or 1,625,723*l.* more than the value of those issued in 1888-89.

The total amount transmitted by Money Orders and Postal Orders in the year was over 42 millions sterling, or 3 millions more than in 1888-89.

There has been an increase in Savings Bank business, though Savings Bank. at a slightly lower rate than in 1888, when the amounts of the deposits transferred from Trustee Savings Banks were unusually large.

The deposits in the year numbered 8,101,120, amounting to 19,814,308*l.*, as against 7,540,625 and 19,052,226*l.*, the number and amount for the year 1888. The withdrawals were 2,757,848 in number, amounting in all to 16,814,268*l.*, showing an increase of 124,040 in number and of 1,011,533*l.* in amount over the number and amount for 1888. As a net result of these transactions a total sum of 62,999,620*l.*, including interest, remained to the credit of depositors on the 31st December 1889, being an increase of 4,443,226*l.* for the year as compared with an increase of 4,582,329*l.* in 1888. The amount of interest credited to depositors was 1,443,186*l.*, or 110,348*l.* more than in 1888.

The greatest number of deposits on one day was 55,095, amounting to 137,836*l.*, and made on the 30th December, but the largest amount deposited on one day was 158,218*l.* on the 31st December. The greatest number of withdrawals on one day was 18,499, amounting to 93,922*l.*, made on the 17th December. The average amount of each deposit was 2*l.* 8*s.* 11*d.* as compared with 2*l.* 10*s.* 6*d.* in 1888. This decrease is, however, chiefly due to the large amounts of many of the transfers from Trustee Savings Banks in 1888. The average amount of each withdrawal was 6*l.* 1*s.* 11*d.* as compared with 6*l.* in 1888.

The number of accounts opened in 1889 was 924,010 and 637,128 were closed. The corresponding numbers for 1888 were

respectively 887,460 and 618,294. The total number of accounts open at the end of the year was 4,507,809, or 286,882 more than in 1888, distributed as follows :—

In 1888 the proportion to population and the average balance were, in England and Wales, 1 in 7 and 13*l.* 17*s.* 3*d.*; in Scotland, 1 in 27 and 8*l.* 8*s.* 11*d.*; and in Ireland, 1 in 28 and 18*l.* 15*s.* 4*d.*, and in the United Kingdom 1 in 9 and 13*l.* 17*s.* 5*d.*

The total number of Post Offices open for the transaction of Savings Bank business on the 31st December 1889 was 9,353, or 331 more than in 1888, of which 286 were opened in England and Wales, 25 in Scotland, and 20 in Ireland. Whenever a new Savings Bank Office is opened a handbill calling attention to the fact and describing the chief advantages of the Post Office Savings Bank system is distributed from house to house in the neighbourhood.

The number of Registered Friendly Societies authorised during the year to open accounts without limit as to amount in the Post Office Savings Bank was 800, and the number of Provident and Charitable Societies authorised to open accounts during the year was 2,197.

Only 284 Penny Banks invested their funds during 1889 as compared with 338 in 1888. Of the number last year 130 were connected with schools, of which 44 were board schools.

A novel experiment was made last year by the Ragged School Union as a first lesson in thrift. At the annual distribution of prizes 335 scholars received from the Union deposit books showing that 5*s.* had been placed to the credit of each in the Post Office Savings Bank. In ordinary circumstances the attendance of a depositor is required when an account is opened but, as in this case such a requirement would have made the arrangement impossible, all the necessary preliminaries were settled in co-operation with the Secretary of the Union, and the President, the Earl of Aberdeen, expressed publicly his thanks to the Department for doing so. By a curious coincidence the same plan appears to have been adopted in Paris, where, at a party given in December last at the Elysée to the pupils of the

Municipal Schools, each child received, as well as toys and clothing, a Savings Bank book with an entry of 10 francs.

Special arrangements also have been made to facilitate the deposit and withdrawal of money in other exceptional cases. On one occasion bonuses amounting to 1,680*l.* were placed to the credit of 340 men employed in a large brewery. A Post Office Clerk attends regularly at Walmer Barracks on pay days to receive deposits, which on an average have numbered 66 at each visit. In the case of a regiment suddenly ordered on Foreign Service, arrangements were made for the repayment of deposits at 24 hours' notice.

The claims made by the representatives of deceased depositors numbered 20,740 as compared with 21,323 in 1888. The applications respecting the money of depositors who had become insane numbered 440 last year, and 377 in 1888. Under the new Regulation made in that year 2,371 transfers of deposits from one account to another were made in 1889.

During the year 31 Trustee Savings Banks were closed and deposits amounting to 716,814*l.*, and stock investments of the nominal value of 13,860*l.*, were transferred to the books of Post Office Savings Bank, in addition to deposits amounting to 48,268*l.* and 3,144*l.* stock transferred in the ordinary course of business. In 1888, 23 Trustee Savings Banks were closed, but the total amount transferred was 1,133,497*l.* with 22,389*l.* stock.

The investments in Government stocks by Savings Bank depositors, numbering 19,766 and amounting to 1,003,368*l.* stock, were only slightly in excess of the transactions for 1888. The total number of stock accounts open on the 31st December 1889 was 46,993, and the total amount of stock held was 4,175,634*l.* Under the new regulations of 1888 the minimum amount of stock purchasable was reduced from 10*l.* to 1*s.*, and last year 470 investments were made of amounts under 10*l.*, 14 of them being of amounts under 1*l.* Under the new regulation permitting the transfer of stock to the names of depositors in the books of the Bank of England, 126 transfers were made in 1889 and the nominal value of the stock so transferred was 21,931*l.* In July 1889 the Local Loans 3 per cent. stock was made available for purchase through the Savings Bank, but, although every effort was made to make the fact known, the number of investments was comparatively small.

Government
Stock
Accounts.

The number of life insurances granted in 1889 was 671 as Life Insurance and Annuities. compared with 580 in 1888, but the amount insured was only 32,832*l.* as against 34,819*l.* Only 1,119 annuities were purchased last year, while the number for 1888 was 1,133. Great efforts have been made to bring more prominently before the public the advantages which the Department offers, and it is hoped that persons will avail themselves more readily of these facilities for making provision for the future. A new notice has been

exhibited in every Post Office in the United Kingdom, and post-masters have been urged to call attention to them. On the 31st December 1889 the number of life insurances in force was 6,504, while the number of immediate annuities was 10,772, and the number of deferred annuities 1,110.*

Telegraph business.

In the course of the year 263 Post Offices and 58 Railway Offices were opened for Postal Telegraph business, making the total numbers of such offices open on the 31st March 5,673 and 1,679 respectively.

The numbers of the various classes of telegrams dealt with as compared with the numbers dealt with last year are given in the following table :—

The average value of ordinary Inland Telegrams was 7·95d. as compared with 7·92d. in 1888-89. The increase in the number of ordinary Inland and Foreign Telegrams at the rate of 8·5 per cent. and 8·1 per cent. respectively may be regarded as satisfactory, as is also the smallness of the increase in the number of Press Telegrams, which are transmitted at very low rates and at a very considerable loss to the revenue. There has, however, been a serious increase, at the rate of nearly 17 per cent., in the number of telegrams on the business of Railway Companies transmitted without charge by the Post Office, under obligations incurred in pursuance of the Statutes under which their telegraphic business and the use of their systems for telegraphic purposes were acquired by the Government.

Railway free Telegrams.

The enormous increase which has taken place in messages of this class and the growth of the burden thus imposed upon the

Post Office Telegraph system is shown in the following table, giving the numbers of telegrams for the five years from 1876 to 1880 and for the five years from 1885-6 to 1889-90. The comparison is more forcible from the fact that in 1871, the year after that of the transfer of the telegraph system to the Post Office, the number of these telegrams sent in England, Wales, and Scotland was only 116,000:—

The value of these messages at only 8d. each would have amounted to more than 43,000*l.* in the year 1889-90.

The following table gives in a convenient form the total cost of the Telegraph Service and its relation to revenue in each of the last seven years. The conversion on the 1st of April 1889 of the stock representing the capital expended in the purchase of the Telegraph System has lessened by about 27,000*l.* a year the permanent charge for interest, but involved an immediate outlay for expenses of 27,370*l.* :—

Foreign
Telegrams.

In my last Report I described the arrangements made for the transfer to this Department on the 1st April 1889 of the business of the Submarine Telegraph Company, and I am glad to state that the transfer has been followed by a large increase in the number of telegrams, due no doubt partly to the reduction in the rates of charge and partly to the improvements made in the Service.

Liverpool has been placed in direct communication with Hamburg and Havre; and London in direct communication with Rome

The following statement gives an analysis of the business passing over the cables transferred to the Post Office in the year ended 31st March last as compared with the business in the previous year :—

APPENDIX J.

"Extracts from a report of the Controller of the Post Office Savings Bank."

(42.) On and from the 14th January 1889, the daily attendance of men clerks, lower division, in this Department (who then numbered 303) was extended from six to seven hours, with increase of pay according to the scale prescribed by Order in Council.

(43.) By the introduction on the 1st January 1890 of new rates of pay for extra duty a considerable benefit has been conferred upon officers of all grades, the general effect of the change being that, as regards extra duty reckoned by time, payment will be made *pro rata* (subject to certain maxima) according to the amount of salary received by each officer.

(44.) The general conduct of the force has been satisfactory. Conduct of force.

(45.) The first portion of the new building is now almost ready for occupation, and will provide for all the force at present located in out-lying premises except for the boy copyists, numbering about 150, for whom the premises No. 111, Queen Victoria Street, will still be retained. This concentration of the staff will, of course, be a great convenience and tend to facilitate business, which has been seriously impeded by the various branches being so widely separated. New building for savings bank department.

(46.) The cost of management in 1889, after deducting the amount received for commission on stock transactions, was 336,954*l.*, as compared with 326,990*l.* in the previous year. Calculated on the gross amounts the average cost per transaction in 1889 is $7\frac{4}{5}d.$ and the percentage of expenses to the total balance of the Post Office Savings Bank 10*s.* $8\frac{1}{4}d.$ against $7\frac{7}{10}d.$ and 11*s.* 2*d.* respectively in 1888. It should be borne in mind, however, that the charges in 1888 include the sum of 40,988*l.* for purchase of land under the Post Office Sites Act, while those in 1889 include 20,663*l.* for a similar purpose, as well as 17,732*l.* in respect of the new building, and if these amounts be deducted, interest at 5 per cent. being added instead, the cost per transaction and the percentage of expenses become $6\frac{8}{10}d.$ and 9*s.* 10*d.* in 1888 and $6\frac{6}{10}d.$ and 9*s.* $6\frac{1}{2}d.$ in 1889. An explanatory note on this point is appended to the first of the following tabular statements.

(47.) The Department was visited during the year by the Postmaster General of Egypt and the Postmaster General of British Guiana, and information respecting the system was furnished to the governments of Canada, Cape Colony, Queensland, Tobago and Trinidad, as well as to various individuals in France and the United States. In the latter country there are still no Post Office Savings Banks.

(48.) The report of the Post Office Savings Bank at the Cape of Good Hope for the year 1888 shows that the open accounts increased by nearly 3,000 making a total of 15,505; that the amount deposited rose from 214,389*l.* to 258,676*l.*; and that the amount due to depositors reached 820,829*l.*, an addition of 54,000*l.* during the year. The facilities for repayment by telegraph are increasingly appreciated, no less than 2,018 withdrawals representing 40,046*l.* having been so effected in 1888, as compared with 681 in 1887 and 160 in 1886. In

- Canada. Canada, the amounts deposited and withdrawn during the year ended the 30th June 1889, were both larger than in the previous year, while the number of depositors was considerably augmented reaching 113,123 with an aggregate balance of 4,602,284*l.* to their credit. In Jamaica the depositors in the Government Savings Bank on the 30th September 1888, numbered 18,311, the total amount due being 393,249*l.* In British Guiana, Post Office Savings Banks commenced business on the 2nd December 1889, the system being very similar to that adopted in the United Kingdom. Six offices were opened, and by the 31st December there were 136 depositors, including 24 coolies, with \$2,279 to their credit. It is stated that some of the deposits bore evident traces of having been *uncarved*, in the literal sense of the word, proving the need which some thrifty persons had experienced of a safe place of deposit. The system of collecting deposits of one shilling by means of stamps is not considered to be suited to the condition and habits of the labouring classes of the Colony. In South Australia, the number of depositors on the 30th June 1889, viz., 64,320 and the balance to their credit, viz., 1,896,217*l.* show an advance of 4,019 and 168,706*l.* respectively during the year. In Queensland, the amount due to 43,003 depositors, viz., 1,611,876*l.* evidences a satisfactory growth of business. In New Zealand, similar progress is observable, the number of accounts being 84,488 with balances amounting to 2,048,441*l.* In Ceylon, the Post Office Savings Bank, which was established in 1885, is stated to have proved a boon to the poorer population, the most gratifying feature being that the best customers are the Singhalese. At the close of 1887, 144 offices were open for the transaction of savings bank business, and the sum due to 6,685 depositors was 129,175 rupees.
- France. (49.) In France, the operations of the Post Office Savings Banks during 1888 are described as very favourable the number of open accounts on 31st December being 1,129,984, and the amount to their credit 10,671,544*l.* The investments by depositors in Government stock were 3,293, the capital invested being 160,596*l.*, a falling off in both respects as compared with the previous year. The withdrawals by telegram which numbered 9,637 amounting to 41,329*l.* show an increase.
- Austria. In Austria there is continued progress, the number of depositors on the 31st December 1889, being 719,431 and the sum standing to their credit 1,747,690*l.*; while in Hungary, which possesses an independent Postal Savings Bank system, the results are likewise satisfactory, 3,225 offices being open on the 31st December 1888, when the depositors numbered 129,887 and the amount standing to their credit was 292,784*l.*
- Hungary. The sum invested in Government Stock on behalf of the depositors during the year was 35,963*l.*, bringing up the total value of stock purchased to 80,560*l.* In Belgium the depositors at the close of 1888 numbered 593,979 with an aggregate balance of 9,999,927*l.*, the former having in eight years trebled and the latter doubled. 2,921 purchases and 1,537 sales of Government Stock were made by depositors during the year, the nominal value of the stock being 341,492*l.* and 217,588*l.* respectively, and on the 31st December there were 8,627 inscriptions of stock in the names of depositors, the amount being 1,862,683*l.* In the Netherlands, at the end of 1888, 1,165,034*l.* stood to the credit of 201,763 accounts. In this country, also, the repayments by telegram are gradually developing. In Sweden, 152,016 depositors, 59 per cent. of whom were minors, held 153,286*l.* on the 31st December 1887. Comparing the deposits and withdrawals in 1887 with those in 1884 there is an increase of over 100 per cent. as regards deposits and of only 35 per cent. as regards withdrawals. Again, in proportion to population

the number of deposits was, it is stated, greater than in France, Italy, or Belgium. In Russia, it is interesting to notice that the establishment of Postal and Telegraph Savings Banks was sanctioned last year, the minimum deposit being fixed at 25 kopeks and the maximum sum which may be deposited at 1,000 roubles. The adoption of Postal Savings Banks in Russia leaves Germany, I believe, alone among the Great Powers of Europe, without such a system. This is the more singular in view of the efforts which are being made in that country to ameliorate the condition of the wage-earning classes.

(50.) I gather from a newspaper published at Honolulu that there is a Post Office Savings Bank in the Hawaiian Kingdom which allows interest at the rate of 5 per cent. on deposits from 25 cents to \$2,500. The cross-entry system is in operation, and the bank is described as having met with wonderful success. It was inaugurated on the 1st July 1886, and, according to a statement of transactions for the year 1889, the amount due on the 31st December to 2,641 depositors was 181,922^l. The funds are employed in carrying out certain public improvements.
