This booklet is intended to be a summary of the ways in which decimalisation of currency will affect charges and services in the Post Office, and to help yoú in your business dealings and transactions with the Post Office both up to Decimal Day 15 February, 1971, and afterwards during the changeover period. The main new decimal charges are shown at the end of this booklet.

The Post Office Guide of course remains the definitive publication on the whole range of Post Office facilities and services, and the decimal version effective from 15 February will be available from Post Offices shortly before that date.

From 15 February the Post Office will operate solely in the new decimal system. It will be necessary for the Post Office to close all its counters, including those at Sub Post Offices, from 1 pm on Friday, 12 February and all day on Saturday, 13 February, 1971, in order to prepare for the conversion. As offices can be expected to be very busy for the first few days after 15 February, please bear this in mind if you have business to transact in this period.

## Cash transactions

From 15 February, only decimal coins (and 6 d pieces) will be given in change. Old 1d and 3d coins will be accepted, but only in multiples of sixpence. We will not exchange coins.

## Cheque transactions

When you make out handwritten bank cheques, Girocheques, money orders or any other payable instrument from 15 February you should write the decimal amounts like this:

Cheques are generally invalid if they are made out in decimal before 15 February, or in £sd on or after 15 February. Cheques, Girocheques, and money orders written in £sd before 15 February will be converted after D Day to decimals by the whole new penny table. The fsd amount is not deleted. The decimal amount is written close to the fsd amount, preferably above it and in a different coloured ink.

## Giro

National Giro will operate in decimal currency from 15 February 1971. fsd documents and balances will be converted to decimal by the whole new penny conversion table. The new halfpenny will not be used in transactions. The National Giro Centre will be closed for business only on Saturday, 13 February, 1971. However, Giro services will not be available at Post Office counters during their closure before 15 February.

From 15 February Giro accounts will operate on a purely decimal basis. Transfers, Deposits and Inpayments, and Withdrawals on Demand should be made out in £sd before 15 February, and in decimal on or after 15 February. Otherwise they are invalid.

In the case of Withdrawals on Application, Girocheques sent to the National Giro Centre for authentication should be made out in decimal from 12 February, 1971.

Giro documents made out in £sd before 15 February and not presented until 15 February or after should be converted by the whole new penny table.

If several cheques are being deposited, each should be converted separately, listed and totalled on the deposit form in decimal.

Giro Standing Orders will be automatically converted to decimal by the whole new penny table, and a fresh Authority is unnecessary. Any Standing Order due for payment on 13 February will be paid on 15 February in decimal.

The National Giro Centre can, by special arrangement, produce Statements of Account in machine readable form. These are on magnetic tape suitable for input to most computers. Tapes with a "Statement date" on or after 15 February will have amounts expressed in decimal.

## Department for National Savings

Post Offices will be closed from 1 pm Friday 12 February and all day on Saturday 13 February. Except during these periods all normal savings services will be available. Savings business will be conducted in decimal terms from 15 February onwards and balances in National Savings Bank accounts will be converted to decimals by the whole new penny table. The new halfpenny will not be used in transactions (except when National Savings Stamps are presented for encashment on or after 15 February and the total contains an odd 6d).

Separate information and leaflets will be available giving details of the changeover to decimal currency of the savings service provided by the Department for National Savings. Meanwhile the following information may be of interest.

## Stocks and Bonds on the National Savings Stock Register

Prior to 15 February: any encashment, dividend, premium or other warrant expected to reach the recipient on or before 12 February 1971 will be issued in $£$ sd.

As the Stock Exchange will be closed on 11 and 12 February, 1971, there will be no investments in or sales of Marketable Securities on the National Savings Stock Register on these dates. You are urged to initiate any fsd transactions as early as possible before these dates. It will be necessary for the Department for National Savings to convert £sd amounts to decimal if the investment request cannot be acted on before 15 February. The purchase of British Savings Bonds will be possible up to 12 February, 1971.

On and after 15 February: all transactions will be in decimal currency only. The new halfpenny will be ignored in transactions in Stocks and Bonds on the National Savings Stock Register.

Stock on the National Savings Stock Register will be converted (by reference to the balance in each account, not the individual amounts on the investment certificates issued) by the whole new penny table.

Stock if previously transferable in multiples of one penny (1d) will be transferable in multiples of one new penny (1p). (Section 8 of the Decimal Currency Act 1969 refers). It is not intended to amend immediately all Investment Certificates on which amounts appear in £sd. An announcement will be made later telling holders when to send them in for amendment.

## Money Orders

Ordinary and Telegraph Money Orders issued from 15 February will be expressed in decimal currency; the new halfpenny will not be used. Poundage and other charges will be in decimal currency.

Orders issued in fsd before 15 February will be converted to decimal by the whole new penny table. The conversion will be made by the counter clerk, unless payment is made through a bank, in which case the onus is on the customer.

Trade Charge Money Orders (Cash on Delivery): Trade Charge Money Order forms and labels accompanying COD parcels handed in for posting on and from 15 February should be expressed in decimal. Orders which were accepted in fsd and which are still in Post Office hands on 15 February will be converted by the Post Office.

From 15 February, certified fsd Trade Charge Money Orders (relating to delivered parcels) will need to be converted by the payee before they are presented to Banks. Senders of COD parcels are therefore advised that during the period 8-13 February 1971 they should express the amounts to be collected in both fsd and decimal.

## Postal Orders

Dual currency postal orders have already been introduced with values expressed both in fsd and decimal. By 15 February all orders will be in dual currency and the $1 \mathrm{~s} 6 \mathrm{~d}, 2 \mathrm{~s} 6 \mathrm{~d}, 3 \mathrm{~s} 6 \mathrm{~d}, 4 \mathrm{~s} 6 \mathrm{~d}$ and guinea orders will have disappeared.

In addition to the dual currency orders, decimal currency orders will be introduced on 15 February for $7 \frac{1}{2} p, 12 \frac{1}{2} p, 17 \frac{1}{2} p$ and $22 \frac{1}{2} p$ denominations. From the same date you can affix decimal stamps, in extension of value, for amounts in $\frac{1}{2} p$ steps up to $4 \frac{1}{2} p$.

The new Postal Order denominations are

The charges for Postal Orders from 15 February 1971 are as stated. (Orders showing the old charge will be sold until stocks are exhausted.)

Cashing Postal Orders from 15 February: £sd amounts (including stamps affixed) will be converted by the whole new penny table, as follows:

Decimal order with decimal stamps affixed-the total decimal value will be paid.

Dual priced or fsd orders with £sd stamps affixed-the total fsd value will be converted to decimal and the total decimal value paid.
£sd orders with decimal stamps affixed-the fsd value of the order will be converted to decimal and the total decimal value paid.

Note: Banks will ignore the $\frac{1}{2} p$ on any total document, i.e., if Postal Orders are paid in on form P490; and similarly if you present for example 3 Postal Orders each ending in a $\frac{1}{2} p$ the banks will ignore the $\frac{1}{2} p$ on each order.

## Franking machines

In preparation for decimalisation the die design of franking machines has been modified to show postage values in pence only. Up to 15 February this should be read as fsd pence. On and after 15 February it should be read as new pence.

Machine conversion: because of the problems that could arise, the Post Office does not intend to renew credit after 15 February for any machine that has not been converted.

The franking machine companies have had for some time a programme of conversion or replacement of existing franking machines, to enable them to be used both before and during decimalisation without any further adjustment. If you have not already had your machine adjusted for use both before and after 15 February, you are advised to contact your franking machine company as soon as possible.

Accounting : from 15 February it will be necessary to make an adjustment to the credit remaining in users' machines, to take account of the higher value of the units. No adjustment will be made to the meters themselves, but the Post Office will send an account to each user shortly after 15 February for the difference betwween the credit remaining as shown in 1 d or $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$ units and the higher value these units will assume on 15 February, i.e. 1 p or $\frac{1}{2}$ p. The difference in value will be obtained by means of the control card which all users submit to the post office weekly.

## Postage stamps

There are 4 high value decimal stamps 10p, 20p, 50p and $£ 1$. The 10 p, 20p and 50 p have exact fsd equivalents- $2 \mathrm{~s}, 4 \mathrm{~s}$ and 10 s respectively-and were issued on 17 June 1970. The $£ 1$ stamp remains unaltered.

The issue date for the low value decimal stamps, comprising 12 denominations ( $\frac{1}{2}$ p, 1 p, $1 \frac{1}{2} p, 2 p, 2 \frac{1}{2} p, 3 p, 3 \frac{1}{2} p, 4 p, 5 p, 6 p, 7 \frac{1}{2} p, 9 p$ ) is Monday 15 February.

Special first day of issue philatelic services will be provided on 15 February. Normal pre-release and philatelic posting box arrangements will apply.

Note: £sd sheet stamps will still be on sale at all offices until Friday 12 February. After D Day $£$ sd stamps will continue to be sold from the Philatelic Bureau and offices with Philatelic counters.

## Stamp books

There will be four decimal stamp books :

The three books sold over the counter will be put on sale on Monday 15 February. The present 2s booklets will continue to be sold from machines outside post offices until late on Sunday 14 February when they will be replaced by the new 10 p booklets.

## Stamp rolls

From 15 February at larger Post Offices, vending machines will dispense strips of 5 decimal stamps ( $2 \mathrm{p}, \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{p}, \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{p}, 1 \mathrm{p}, 1 \mathrm{p}$ ). for 5 p . At some other offices vending machines will be dispensing 1 p stamps.

Single value rolls of stamps for use in stamp affixing machines will be available from 15 February in $2 \frac{1}{2} p$ and $3 p$ denominations. The mixed value rolls will also be available for private machine owners.

## Stamped stationery

Decimal stamped stationery will be put on sale from 15 February. The range of items will be:

## Overseas

From 15 February until 1 July 1971 the overseas registration fees will remain as at present: 15 p. Because of this there will be a special overseas registered envelope the same size as the present $H$ registered envelope. The new envelope will be known as H 2 and will have a 15 p 'registration only' stamp embossed on it. The envelopes costing 17p, will remain on sale until 30 June 1971. Adhesive stamps will need to be added in payment of the appropriate postage rate. (Note: on 1 July the overseas registration fee will be brought into line with the inland fee and from then G, H and K envelopes should be used for both inland and overseas registered postings.)

## fsd stamps and stamped stationery after 15 February

£sd stamps and stamped stationery can be used throughout the changeover period by converting the total £sd value to decimal by the halfpenny table and adding any decimal stamp necessary to make up the new postal rate.

The Post Office will also repurchase stamps bought for postal purposes within the last two years. This is the normal repurchase scheme and a charge of $12 \frac{1}{2} \%$ is made.

In addition, an extension to the normal repurchase scheme allows for all fsd stamps issued within the current reign to be repurchased whether or not they were bought for postal purposes. The charge for this service is $15 \%$ of the face value of the stamps.

Ask at your nearest Post Office for details of both schemes.

## National Insurance stamps

Decimal National Insurance rates will be introduced on 15 February and Esd stamps will be withdrawn from sale at the close of business on 12 February. But £sd stamps may be used up for weeks which follow 15 February and decimal stamps may be used for earlier weeks if necessary. The same National Insurance cards should continue to be used after 15 February even though fsd rates are shown on them.

There may be circumstances in which £sd stamps bought for use before 15 February are not suitable for use afterwards; for example staff to whom particular rates apply may no longer be employed. Subject to the normal conditions that these stamps are not spoiled and do not exceed $£ 75$ in value they may be used in part payment for decimal stamps at other rates. This arrangement will last until 26 March 1971.

There will be the same number of stamps, ie 35, and they will be printed in sheets of $200(10 \times 20)$.

The full range of decimal insurance stamps and the values which they replace is shown on next page.

## Pre-payment in money:

## Postage Credit and Deposit Accounts

The procedure will remain the same on decimalisation.

## Inland Revenue Land Fee stamps

The fsd range of stamps will be withdrawn and replaced by a decimal range on 15 February, 1971.

## National Insurance stamps

The full range of decimal insurance stamps and the values they replace.


In assessing the decimal values the DHSS have had to convert both the employers' and the employees' contribution into separate payable decimal amounts. Because of this the new rates will not necessarily be the exact conversion table equivalents of the old fsd values.

## Postal Services

Most inland postal prices are being increased on 15 February 1971 to enable the postal service to pay its way. Therefore decimal charges shown for most inland postal services are not conversions of the fsd charges in force before 15 February.

Overseas postal charges are not being increased on 15 February.

## Telecommunications Services

Telecommunications charges will be expressed in decimal from 15 February. At present most coin boxes operate on sixpenny and shilling pieces; the older prepayment type boxes operate on pennies and also accept sixpenny and shilling pieces. All telephone coin boxes are to be converted to accept $2 p$ and 10 p pieces. The conversion will start immediately after 15 February and is expected to be completed by the end of March. The decimal charges for inland calls and calls to the Irish Republic from coin boxes, for which coins have to be inserted, will apply from the time the particular coin box is converted to accept the new coins.

During the closure of Post Office counters from 1 pm on Friday 12 February and all day on Saturday 13 February 1971 it will not be possible for inland or international telegrams to be accepted over the counter at Post Offices but such telegrams will continue to be accepted by telephone, telex and private wire. Non urgent international telegrams and Inland Greetings Telegrams, for delivery during the period of closure, should be handed in before Friday 12 February. Delivery of inland and international telegrams in this country will continue normally during this period.
